



Obituary for Anne Latimer Nyland

Anne Latimer Nyland died on February 27, 2018 at age 99 in Edmonton Alberta. She was a leader in developing public library services across Ontario and Nova Scotia. After graduating with her BLS from the University of Toronto in 1941 she became Librarian in Charge of the Fort Frances Library until 1945. She was Chief Librarian of the Pembroke Library until 1950 and then led the Essex County Library Cooperative until 1958. In Nova Scotia she was Assistant Director of the Nova Scotia Provincial Library and then became the first Chief Librarian of the Halifax County Regional Library. In 1964 she became Chief Librarian of the Cornwall Public Library and in 1970 took on the added responsibility as Chief Executive Officer of the Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry County Library. Throughout her career she was active in library associations both provincial and national. In 1982 she was awarded the Ontario Library Trustees' Association Award of Merit for distinguished service. She retired in 1984.

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News from New Brunswick

News from New Brunswick Public Library Service

The New Brunswick Public Library Service (NBPLS) is continuing to collaborate with New Brunswick cultural institutions to offer free admission passes in all 63 NB public libraries. In March, patrons were able to check out passes to the *Village historique acadien* and in May, they could check out passes to the New Brunswick Museum. More pass lending initiatives will be taking place later this year.

In May, Fredericton Public Library launched the *Sun Life Financial Musical Instrument Lending Library* – the first of its kind in Atlantic Canada. Thanks to support from Sun Life Financial, instruments are now available for loan at the downtown and Nashwaaksis branches of the library. The collection was unveiled at a ceremony involving JUNO award-winning singer/songwriter, David Myles, who is originally from Fredericton.

In June, NBPLS launched the 2018 Summer Reading Club. This year's theme is: Careers. Thanks to funding from the *Department of Post-Secondary Education, Training and Labour*, 81 young people were hired to work as Summer Reading Club Activity Leaders.

News from Bibliothèque Champlain (Université de Moncton)

Institutional repository

L'Université de Moncton has recently announced that an ad hoc committee will be formed to implement an institutional repository. Currently, researchers here use repositories from other institutions (e.g. <u>Dalhousie University</u>) to store their research online.

Although this process is in its infancy, many researchers here are no doubt looking forward to the day when they can transfer their research here from external repositories. This <u>example from Dalhousie</u> <u>University</u> states that "if your institution implements a repository in the future, Dalhousie University will, at your direction, facilitate the transfer of your material to your institution's repository".

Predatory publishing awareness

Librarians at Bibliothèque Champlain will continue their ongoing efforts to educate university faculty and researchers about the perils of predatory publishing. Our university, like countless other institutions, is not immune to predatory publishers who wish to collect publishing fees without offering a peer review process. Authors who choose these journals/editors as an outlet for their research risk losing money and, perhaps more importantly, having their professional reputations damaged.

In August, librarians will be presenting on this topic during the *Leadership and teaching support service's* (*Service d'animation et de soutien à l'enseignement*) workshop week. Our attendance at these workshops represents a step forward because this new platform is open to the entire university community whereas previous presentations were aimed at each librarian's own schools and faculties.

Librarians will address the red flags to avoid when choosing a journal for publication as well as the new policy adopted by the *Faculty of advanced studies and research* (*Faculté des études supérieures et de la recherche*) which states that faculty and researchers may have their choice of journals scrutinized in the event of an application for permanence, promotion, etc.

Entente entre les bibliothèques du CCNB et de l'Université de Moncton

Communiqué de presse du Collège Communautaire du Nouveau-Brunswick

MONCTON, 9 mars 2018 – Les bibliothèques du CCNB et de l'Université de Moncton ont accepté d'étendre le privilège d'emprunt direct aux usagères et usagers des deux établissements. Les étudiantes et étudiants du CCNB et de l'Université de Moncton pourront bientôt emprunter des livres des bibliothèques de l'autre établissement.

« Le CCNB et l'U de M partagent un même logiciel de bibliothèque depuis quelques années. À titre d'exemple, un étudiant de l'Université de Moncton, campus de Moncton, qui fait une recherche dans le catalogue peut voir tous les livres qui se retrouvent, entre autres, à la bibliothèque du CCNB — Campus de Dieppe. Cette entente lui permettra de se rendre en personne au Collège pour emprunter ces livres », a raconté Julie Lefrançois, gestionnaire des bibliothèques du CCNB.

Les étudiantes et étudiants, les professeures et professeurs, les enseignantes et enseignants, les chercheuses et chercheurs et les autres membres du personnel des établissements collégiaux et universitaires pourront aussi profiter de cette entente. Ils n'auront qu'à présenter leur carte d'identité de l'Université, du Collège ou de la bibliothèque et être dûment enregistrés dans la bibliothèque de leur campus d'origine. À noter que cette entente exclut les bibliothèques suivantes de l'Université de Moncton : la Bibliothèque de droit Michel Bastarache, le Centre de ressources pédagogiques et Centre de formation médicale du Nouveau-Brunswick.

« La collaboration entre les bibliothèques des deux établissements ne date pas d'hier. En effet, depuis 2010, les étudiantes et étudiants collégiaux et universitaires des campus d'Edmundston partagent les services de la bibliothèque Rhéa-Larose », a rapporté Émilie Lefrançois, directrice de la bibliothèque Rhéa-Larose de l'Université de Moncton, campus d'Edmundston.

Enfin, le projet de cohabitation à Shippagan laisse présager une autre belle occasion de collaboration entre les bibliothèques.

« Ce service d'emprunt coopératif entre nos bibliothèques permettra aux usagères et usagers d'obtenir d'une autre collection un document qui, avant cette entente, n'était pas à leur disposition dans leurs bibliothèques respectives, souligne Jacques Paul Couturier, recteur et vice-chancelier par intérim de l'Université de Moncton. Nos deux établissements bénéficieront grandement de cette collaboration qui rendra accessible une plus grande variété de documents. »

La PDG du CCNB, Liane Roy, se dit très satisfaite de la tournure des événements. « Cette entente est très avantageuse pour les étudiantes et étudiants et les membres du personnel, car elle donne accès à un plus grand éventail de ressources documentaires pour la recherche et la rédaction de travaux. Tout le monde en sort gagnant! Merci à nos collègues de l'Université de Moncton qui ont accepté de travailler avec nous sur cette entente », a indiqué Mme Roy.

Research Bootcamp

For the fourth year in a row, the Dal Libraries offered Research Bootcamp, a suite of popular sessions designed for graduate students as well as teaching and research assistants.

Librarians lead sessions on topics such as: library basics; literature reviews (searching and writing); citation tools; writing abstracts & grant



proposals; copyright, open access & predatory publishers; legal resources; business and competitive intelligence resources; PubMed and other health sciences databases; humanities resources; Canadian data and stats; grey literature; research data management; Excel; data visualization; and conference posters.

Dal Libraries at Doors Open Halifax

In June, the Dal Libraries participated in Doors Open Halifax, an annual event that makes free access to buildings of historical, contemporary or architectural significance to the general public. We welcomed nearly 1,500 visitors to our exhibit over the weekend.





Since we're celebrating Dal 200 all year, the team in the Archives pulled out all the stops and put together a display including historical documents and binders of hundreds of photographs from Dal's history, as well as materials from some of our other collections such as items relating to Neptune Theatre, the Olands, the Bluenose, and the Nova Scotia Tattoo.

Dal Libraries Supporting Dal's 200th Anniversary

Libraries are much more digital these days, but the Dalhousie Libraries are getting back to their roots of books and archival materials to celebrate Dal 200.

In September 2018, Dalhousie will have a bigger-than-ever presence at Halifax's <u>Word on the Street</u>, a festival designed to encourage discussion on the value of literature and literacy.

"Word on the Street is a perfect place for Dalhousie to be, especially for Dal 200," says Donna Bourne-Tyson, University Librarian. "Thousands of people come out for the festival, many of whom have some connection to Dalhousie. For those who don't, it's a chance for us to make a connection with them by showing them what we have to offer, whether it be programs, events, or books."

At the Word on the Street festival, Dal will have an author's stage. Marlo MacKay, communications coordinator for the Dalhousie Libraries, says they've got an exciting line-up of five authors, including several current faculty members, all with a connection to Dal.

"We want to ensure that Dalhousie's diversity and community impact are reflected in the chosen authors," says MacKay.


Connecting with History

The Dal Libraries' Archives has been buzzing with activity for several years in preparation for Dal 200. Michael Moosberger, Dalhousie's associate university librarian for archives, special



collections, and records management, is also a member of the campus-wide planning team for Dal 200.

"The Archives hold a wealth of Dalhousie history, and of course, to celebrate a milestone like this, we want to look back on it," he said.




The Archives have taken a digital copy of *The Lives of Dalhousie*, <u>Volumes 1 (1818-1925)</u> and <u>2 (1925-1980)</u> and made it available for online viewing on GitBook, an open source online book-hosting platform. The digitized versions will also be uploaded to DalSpace, Dalhousie's institutional repository. The final phase of the project includes creating an enhanced digital edition of the original volumes, with additions such as links and images, in an online exhibit format to complement and enhance the print volumes.

"As the Archive of the university, we digitize significant university publications and photographs on an ongoing basis, but we are putting some extra resources into this effort in time for 2018," says Moosberger. "At present, we have digitized copies of the *Dalhousie*

Gazette, Pharos, university calendars, as well as photographs from Dal's Athletics and Communications & Marketing departments."

In addition, the Dal Libraries have provided significant archival research support to the Dal 200 anniversary website's historical timeline, their daily *This day in Dal* social media posts, and a book called *Dalhousie University: a 200th Anniversary Portrait*. This program allows anyone with a valid NLPL library card to borrow a variety of musical instruments. Patrons wanting to explore a new musical passion now have a "no commitment" opportunity to test it out.

This fantastic new initiative kicked off with a launch at the A.C. Hunter Library which included a musical number and speech by singer-songwriter and best-selling author Alan Doyle. In addition to his song and the excitement he brought to the event, Alan Doyle also donated the signed guitar that he played that day and a signed bodhran he played when touring with *Great Big Sea*.



Instruments available to borrow include mandolins, acoustic & electric guitars, ukuleles, violins, and digital pianos & keyboards. We also have percussion instruments such as bongos, djembes, cajons, and doumbeks. And because of the importance they play in our musical heritage, accordions are also available for loan. There was demand for all the instruments the minute the program launched.
