

John D. Blackwell Named Chair of CHOICE Editorial Board

At the annual conference of the American Library Association held this past June in Chicago, John D. Blackwell <http://www.stfx.ca/people/jblackwe/>, Academic Funding and Research Officer at St. Francis Xavier University, was appointed chair of the editorial board of CHOICE: Current Reviews for Academic Libraries <http://www. ala.org/acrl/choice/home.html>. A member of the editorial board since 1998, Blackwell is the first Canadian to serve on the board in CHOICE's 37- year history.

Published by the Association of College and Research Libraries, a division of the American Library Association, CHOICE is the premier review journal for academic books and electronic resources in the English-speaking world. Last year, CHOICE also launched Choice Reviews.online <http://www.Choice Reviews.org>, a highly acclaimed full-text database of more than 70,000 reviews of books and electronic resources. This year, CHOICE will introduce a site license version with consortial pricing.

The CHOICE Editorial Board, which is responsible for guiding the course of this two million dollar (US) publishing operation, conducts formal business meetings at ALA's midwinter and annual conferences, as well as numerous virtual meetings throughout the year.

John Blackwell graduated from Dalhousie University's School of Library and Information Studies in 1993. Before taking up the position of Academic Funding and Research Officer <http://www.stfx.ca/campus/service/academic_funding_and_

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research/> at StFX, he was Reference Librarian/Collections Coordinator at Brandeis University in Boston. He is former Chair of the Canadian Studies Discussion Group (Association of College and Research Libraries) and has served on various committees of the Canadian Library Association, including the Monographs Editorial Board. He regularly reviews print and electronic titles for several leading publications in Canada and the United States.

John Blackwell and his partner, Dr. Laurie Stanley-Blackwell, are widely known for their Web publications. For instance, their regularlyupdated Canadian Studies: A Guide to the Sources <http://www.iccsciec.ca/blackwell.html> is published by the International Council for Canadian Studies. Numerous universities around the globe link to this extensive Web resource. It is also used in political science, history, and library school courses across Canada and the United States. Since April 2000, the site has had over 30,000 visitors.

Marilyn Rennick Receives First Outstanding Alumni Award

The Associated Alumni and the School of Library and Information Studies are very pleased to announce that Marilyn Rennick (MLS, 1976) has been selected as recipient first of the the Outstanding Alumni Award. This award was established by the Associated Alumni in 1999 to honour graduates who have made an outstanding contribution to Library and Information Studies.

Since graduation in 1976, Ms. Rennick has held a number of responsible positions at the University of Ottawa, where over the past decade she has played a key role in the delivery of government information on the campus. In her current position as Government Information Specialist she is responsible for promoting the use of government information at the university as well as dealing with governments and international organizations to ensure access to a wide variety of government information products. In addition to her professional position, Ms. Rennick has given significant leadership to the Association of Professors of the University of Ottawa serving as the

Association's President in 1997/98 and 1998/99.

Ms. Rennick's energy, enthusiasm and professional commitment have extended far beyond the University of Ottawa campus. She has been an active member of the Committee Advisory for the Depository Services Program (DSP) of Public Works and Government Services Canada, and she has served on a Treasury Board Committee that reviewed the DSP. In the wider professional community she has taken leadership roles with the Canadian Library Canadian Association, the Association of Special Libraries and Information Services, the Canadian Association of Law Libraries, the Canadian Association of Public Data Users, the Library Association Ottawa/Hull, and of the Ottawa/Hull Law Librarians Association of which she is the current president. Ms. Rennick has contributed her skills and knowledge as a speaker and convener of numerous conferences and workshops, and her publications have appeared in several professional journals.

Beyond these accomplishments Ms. Rennick is noted for her additional community activities, including committee work in the Parish of St. George Anglican Church in Ottawa, editor of the Ottawa Area Committee Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship newsletter, and member of the Urban Christian Outreach Board of Directors, which is a ministry focused on literacy for homeless and street people.

The Outstanding Alumni Award was officially presented to Ms. Rennick at a reception at Dalhousie University, hosted by the Associated Alumni. Susan McLean, Deputy CEO of the Halifax Regional Library and also a member of the class of 1976, read the citation. The selection committee for the 2000 award consisted of Nancy Black, chair (University of Northern British Columbia), John Blackwell (St. Francis Xavier University), Shelley Hawrychuk (University of Toronto at Mississauga), and Dr. Richardson Joanna (Bond University, Australia).

New Brunswick's first ever Pubic Libraries Week was celebrated from October 16 to 21. The Premier signed an official declaration of the week. The theme "the Power of the Card / Ma carte, mon passe-partout", is illustrated by posters and bookmarks featuring the new plasticised library card. With the completion of the automation project in August, a library card gives every user access to the holdings of each and every public library in the province. Libraries have always provided a window on the world through books and other materials, but with automation in place, and with the installation of the Gates public access computers in many branches this fall, that window will be even bigger. Special events and activities were held across the province, with the official launch at the Fredericton Public Library.

The name of the New Brunswick Library Service has changed to the New Brunswick Public Library Service / Service des bibliothèques publiques du Nouveau-Brunswick. The addition of the word "public" to the name is to clarify the role of this service. It has moved in August, to join the rest of the Department of Education, of which it has been a part since March 2000. They can now be found on the ground floor of Place 2000, a new building at 250 King Street, Fredericton.

New Brunswick Lieutenant-Governor, Marilyn Trenholme Counsell has recognized ten differ-

ent groups and individuals for their outstanding contributions to the lives of small children. The Lieutenant Governor's Early Childhood literacy Awards 2000 were handed out at the New Brunswick Legislature on September 10. In the library category, the Dr. Walter Chestnut Public Library in Hartland and La Bibliothèque publique La Moisson de Saint-Quentin were highlighted for their programs which focus on the importance of reading to newborns. Two awards in the Individual category were handed out. Dianne Elizabeth Clowater of Boiestown was honoured for her imaginative programs for preschool children at the Bojestown Community Library. Linda Landry, director, director of the Mon Soleil daycare in Beresford, was lauded for her project which saw children from two to five years of age create their own story books.

Le Club de lecture d'été 2000 "Lire, c'est dans ma nature : Read, It's In Your Nature" a connu un franc succès. Ë titre d'exemple, dans la région de bibliothèques du Haut-Saint-Jean, nous comptons 1779 inscriptions, 52085 livres lus et 1153 contrats terminés. Afin de récompenser les jeunes d'avoir participé à ce programme, plusieurs bibliothèques ont organisé des activités d'animation, sous forme de "fête de clôture". The Committee has chosen the theme slogan for next summer's province-wide program. The theme will be Western, and the slogan will be Westwords / La ruée vers la lecture". The York Library Region will be responsible for producing the posters, logbooks and other supporting materials, and the launch will be held in York Region early next summer.

Many libraries in the province continue fundraising efforts. In the Albert-Westmorland -Kent region a variety of means such as plant sales, book sales, yard sales, selling of book bags were effective. A more

unusual fundraising event was held in Port Elgin. Library Board members and their friends presented the stage play Murder in the Library in a local community hall. The interactive murder mystery was very successful with many people asking that the board do it again next summer. Some of this region's donations of material worthy of mention are the Swiss Consulate's donation of fifty books to the Moncton Public Library in appreciation for the library's exhibit of the works of Swiss writer and photographer, Nicolas Bouvier, during last year's Francophone Summit. The remaining stock from a local bookstore, Friends Forever, which closed some months ago, was donated to the regional library — a gift consisting of 6000 books. One hundred and twenty classical compact disks were also donated to the regional library recently.

The annual region-wide workshop for employees of the Albert-Westmorland-Kent Library Region took place in October and featured a lively exchange of information as well as a session on communicating effectively in the face of various behaviours.

The Sainte-Antoine and Salisbury Public Libraries celebrated twenty years of service to the citizens of their communities. Dignitaries representing the municipality and the province were on hand for both events. The representative of the Department of Education presented the library with a gift of books to underline the occasion.

Doris Rauch, Engineering Library, UNB, and Laurette Mackey, Regional Librarian, York Regional Library (Fredericton) attended the 66th International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions Annual Conference in Jerusalem in August 2000 and presented a paper on "Mobile Libraries in Canada".

Donations and fund-raising effort / Des dons et activités de levée de fonds:

The Fredericton Public Library recently received a wonderful gift from the family of Don Walker. A lifetime of collecting had resulted in a personal library of over 700 books at the time of Mr. Walker's death. "Many people have over 700 books to their name," said Head Librarian Bill Molesworth, "but few collect with Mr. Walker's fixity of purpose. His focus was military history and his books cover conflicts from earliest history to the Gulf War, though the preponderance of material is on the two World Wars, and in many cases, there is a strong Canadian perspective which is often lacking in books on these subjects." The collection, that also includes volumes on various intelligence agencies including the Mossad, KGB, CIA, MI6 and the RCMP, is receiving a lot of attention. A quick count recently indicated that over a third of the books were in circulation. "It's a valuable gift, one that both staff patrons appreciate", Mr. and Molesworth said, "and we can't thank the family of Mr. Walker enough for their generous donation."

La Caisse populaire de Memramcook has, once again this vear, donated \$3000 to the Memramcook Public Library to cover the cost of supplies needed for the Literacy for Kids program, for prizes for the Summer Reading Club and craft materials. This ongoing donation makes a difference to the type of program which can be offered at this small library.

The Moncton Library's latest fund-raising effort involves selling book bags and greetings cards. The library received the rights to reproduce on cards three engravings by well-known artist David Silverberg who is currently the Artist in Residence at Acadia University. Each book bag is unique, made of various fabrics, fully lined with a pocket displaying the International Reading Symbol. In addition to selling the cards and bags locally, the Moncton Public Library Board is ready to offer them to other libraries at a reasonable price for their own fund-raising.

New Brunswick School Libraries

New Brunswick School Libraries are still being supported at the provincial level. The Department of Education has continued to offer to schools the opportunity to automate their libraries with the Follett Circulation Plus system. A number of districts are participating in this program. Schools received either the Windows version the Circulation Plus software and a new scanner. Schools that already had the software received new scanners. The Department has signed a threeyear support agreement with Follett to take the pressure off schools struggling to find the funds to pay for it out of their library budgets. The agreement gave the Province the responsibility for providing the first level of technical support to our schools. In order to provide this, a number of technicians from around the province went to Fredericton for four days of training by Follett rep-The Help Desk in resentatives. Fredericton will contact these trainees who will go to the school to provide on site assistance.

A number of schools are participating in the Hackmatack Children's Choice Award. At present the books are in English but APLNB/ABPNB expect to be able to offer a French component by the Fall of 2001.

New Brunswick was invited to

participate in a CSLA teleconference chaired by President Ray Doiron on December 3. Roch Carrier, National Librarian, had requested statistical information from each province. This information was collated by the CSLA executive and presented to Mr. Carrier. He requested a meeting with Ray Doiron to discuss this paper. A template is being developed to assist with the collation of data across the country.

The Superintendency Steering Committee for School Libraries in Superintendency Four, the area from Rexton to Tide Head, developed an Information Resource Empowerment Model this fall. This model consisted of two days of training for one or two teachers from each school in the three districts. Day One was a session on "Integrating an Information Skills Model into Curriculum Design" led bv Ann Tepe, Director of Curriculum Integration for Follett Software Company. Day Two had components on Internet Research and World Book Online. Teachers who participated are now conducting research units with their students. Once that is completed the school can request supply teacher time so these teachers may work with other teachers and students in the schools on other research projects. This project is under the direction of the Superintendent, Kathy Baldwin.

The Department of Education had a committee study how the maximum benefit can be realized from public funds for all the Departments and Agencies that provide services to promote life-long learning among the general public. The report made a number of recommendations. Final results of this study have not been made public at this date.


On November 18-19, the St. John's Libraries held another of their popular book sales at the Arts and Culture Centre.

Eastern Horizons: Canadian Children's Literature at the Millennium, held October 19-21 in St. John's, attracted over 1300 teachers, librarians, writers and parents, to a program packed with presentations by 19 top Canadian illustrators and authors, as well as educators and other professionals who use literature in their work with children. From the opening kevnote by Janet Lunn "Celebration (The years since Anne)"-, to final presentations on Saturday afternoon, feedback received by conference organizers was extremely positive. Plans will soon be underway for a second Eastern Horizons conference to be held in 2003. The conference was organized by the St. John's Children's Literature Round Table. which is facilitated by the Public Library's Children's Collections Librarian, and included the Atlantic Provinces Library Association among its sponsors. Public events held in conjunction with the conference were equally successful, attracting large audiences. These included two Canada Council-sponsored public readings hosted by A.C.

Hunter Children's Library in St. John's, one by award-winning author of the Guests of War trilogy. Kit Pearson, on October 17th, and the other by accomplished illustrator Janet Wilson (In Flanders Fields, Sarah May and the New Red Dress) on October 24th. Several of the authors & illustrators presenting at Eastern Horizons (Linda Granfield, Werner Zimmermann, Ian Wallace, Kevin Major, Janet McNaughton, Janet Wilson) visited schools in the area before and after the conference. In Western Newfoundland / Labrador efforts have been expended ordering many new books, thereby increasing circulation divisionwide over last year. The Division libraries are working to put the Gates Computer Initiative into effect. Elinor Benjamin has been active in training local library technicians in computer use, and Bob Brake and his IT support staff have been placing new computers in 22 sites.

The Western Newfoundland / Labrador Libraries sponsored three very successful author tours. Sherry Fitch toured Western Newfoundland in the spring. During the Fall, Marilyn Peringer toured in Western Newfoundland, while Alan Daniel was in Labrador.

CBRL Celebrates 50 Years

The year 2000 marks a milestone for the Cape Breton Regional Library. It is our fiftieth anniversary. Thanks to the efforts of community leaders such a J.J. Tompkins and others, the Regional Library was established. On August 31, 1950 the Cape Breton Regional Headquarters and Sydney Branch Library were officially opened. By December of the same year branches were opened in Dominion, Glace Bay, Louisbourg, New Waterford, North Sydney and the Cape Breton County Bookmobile. Today, 13 branches and two bookmobiles comprise the System.

Throughout the year, CBRL has been celebrating its 50th Anniversary with open houses in all the branch libraries. These celebrations culminated Sunday, October 1 with an open house at the McConnell Library in Sydney. Cochaired by Rosalie Gillis and Theresa MacDonald, approximately 150 people attended the celebration that included addresses by Mayor David Muise, Board Chair Rod MacArthur, Dr. Robert Morgan, and Regional Librarian Ian MacIntosh. Emcee was staff member, Donald Ward. Highlights included a fascinating talk on the history of Cape Breton Libraries by historian Dr. Robert Morgan, of the Beaton Institute, University College of Cape Breton, and the unveiling of a stain glass window commissioned to celebrate the anniversary. The stain glass window depicts the blue skies and oceans of Cape Breton and is based on the Cape Breton seal, which the library uses for its logo.

Celtic Colours Conversation Series

For the third vear. the McConnell Library in Sydney will be the host to the Celtic Colours Conversation Series in conjunction with the Celtic Colours Festival. International From October 10 to 13, the brown bag lunch series will feature local and international musicians, scholars, and story tellers. Among the presenters will be Gaelic singer and harpist, Alvth MacCormack from Scotland, traditional singer Roddy Campbell from the Isle of Barra, historian Dr. Richard MacKinnon from the University College of Cape Breton, and story teller and native Gaelic speaker Murdoch MacNeil from Christmas Island, Cape Breton. There will be talks on traditional

Celtic music, the architecture of the Cape Breton Gaelic settler, and finishing on Friday 13th with stories relating to forerunners and ghost stories.

Academic Libraries

Robertson Library at the University of Prince Edward Island celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary in conjunction with the UPEI Founder's Day on September 14 with an Open House. The Friends of the Robertson Library presented a rare copy of Milton Acorn's book, In Love and anger, for the PEI Collection. The Library was also presented with Forward in faith : establishing the School of Nursing at University of Prince Edward Island written by former Dean Margaret Munro and volume one of Nationalism and ethnicity terminologies: an encyclopedic dictionary and research guide by retired professor, Dr. Thomas Spira. The editorial team from the Institute of Island Studies presented their publication, Message in a bottle: the literature of small islands. The final presentation and reading was by poet and English professor Brent MacLaine of his book of poems entitled Wind and root.

Robertson Library recently opened its Learning Lab, an instructional computer lab consisting of 13 Pentiums located in the library. The equipment was donated to the library by the Webster Foundation.

Holland College has now published the first in a series of online information skills training on the Web. Andrea Stewart and Donald Moses teamed up to produce "Internet Survivor", which sends up the popular TV program and uses other examples from popular culture to teach basic searching skills. "Survivor" uses WebCT tools such as its bulletin board, quiz package, and student management features to monitor student progress and provide additional interactivity. Eventually, staff hope to offer a complete online information competencies curriculum on their site.

Public Libraries

The public library system on P.E.I. will be adding a new branch in the New Year. The twenty- fifth branch will open sometime in January in Stratford, P.E.I., the community directly across the Hillsborough River from Charlottetown.

Johanne Jacob of the Provincial Library Service (recently convener of APLA's Francophone Interest Group) has been seconded from her position as French Services Librarian to oversee the planning and construction of a new French school and community centre in Summerside. The project is intended to house a combined school and public library facility. The secondment will last until Jan. 30, 2002.

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Alberta Letts Travel Award

This note is written as a followup to the exchange of letters between Mary (Mollie) E. Cameron and Peter Webster published in the APLA Bulletin (July/August 2000, p. 10) concerning the Alberta Letts Memorial Award now absorbed into the general APLA Memorial Awards.

In 1976 Dalhousie University established the Alberta Letts Travel Award to mark the many contributions made by Alberta Letts to library services in Nova Scotia and her support for the establishment of the School which opened in 1969. The Award is made annually to a member of the first year MLIS class in the School of Library and Information Studies to underwrite the travel costs for attendance at the annual conference of the Canadian Library Association (CLA) of which Alberta Letts was a former President.

The source of the original money for this Award came from the winding up of the operations of a small bookstore on campus that was established by a group of professors, acting as trustees. The store was run by a committee of faculty members and students from some time before 1935 and operated until about 1946. For a number of years the income from the fund was used to buy magazines for the student residences. This practice was discontinued in the 1960s and the income was allowed to accumulate under the name of the "Dalhousie University Store" fund. In 1976, after discussion with Norman Horrocks, then Director of the School, the trustees of the fund (Dr John Graham and Professor R.S. Cumming) recommended to Dalhousie President Henry D. Hicks that the funds be turned over to the University and be named the Alberta Letts Travel Award Fund.

In the early years of the Fund the School offered an Alberta Letts Memorial Lecture. The lecturers included Dr. Elizabeth Morton, first executive director of CLA, Dr. Guy Henson, Director of Dalhousie's Institute of Public Affairs (who as Director of the Adult Education Division in the N.S. Department of Education was instrumental in bringing Alberta Letts to Nova Scotia as Assistant Director of Libraries for the province), and Dr. Violet Coughlin of the University of Toronto Faculty of Library Science. The lecture by Dr. Morton was published by the School as its Occasional Paper # 9, with the proceeds from its sale being added to the Alberta Letts Memorial Fund.

The Alberta Letts Travel Award was first awarded in 1977 to Linda Keddy who was a graduate in political science from the University of New Brunswick and before entering the School had worked for two years at the York Regional Library in Fredericton. Linda is now Director of Research at Pink. Breen, Larkin Barristers & Solicitors in Halifax. The latest recipient is Rebecca Larocque, a B.A. graduate in Politics with a concentration in public administration and Canadian government from Brock University. who attended the CLA 2000 Conference in Edmonton.

With the Alberta Letts Travel Award, the School of Library and Information Studies is able to regularly honour an outstanding librarian while at the same time promote the career development of new professionals.

MARGARET WILLIAMS TRUST FUND AWARD

In her essay for the ALA scholarship, she noted that her experience in providing a listener with archival material helped her realize that Òlinking people to the information they want is what it's all about."

Ms. Davies has also received the Alumni Scholarship awarded each year by the School of Library and Information Studies to an excellent incoming student in the Master of Library and Information Studies programme. This Scholarship, made possible by an endowment established by alumni to mark the twenty-fifth anniversary of the School, is awarded on the basis of academic excellence and evidence of a commitment to a career in librarianship.

Dal Libraries, Dalhousie University News release - December 6, 2000 Relais and the Dal Libraries

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In 2000 the Dalhousie Libraries made a consortial purchase (with the Libraries at Memorial University and the University of New Brunswick) to acquire Relais, the electronic document delivery system of Relais International. This is the first time that members of the Council of Atlantic University Libraries (CAUL) have undertaken a joint system implementation across provincial boundaries.

The current version, Relais 2.3, streamlines the processing of requests from other libraries for material held at Dalhousie in a number of ways. It automatically checks for holdings and call number information from the Novanet catalogue, then prints the requests in a predetermined order for easy retrieval from the stacks. Once retrieved, articles are scanned and delivered electronically to the requesting library. Upon scanning, the management system is also updated automatically, eliminating yet another time-consuming step and many paper files.

A future version, 3.0, to be implemented in 2001, will streamline the procedures involved in requesting material from other libraries on behalf of Dalhousie faculty, staff and students. It enables Document Delivery staff to search several national bibliographic databases, to have the results of these searches linked to the request and the request sent to a holding library.

The complete Relais system will expediate the handling of everincreasing numbers of interlibrary loan / document delivery requests. (The Killam Library alone processed over 20,000 requests in 1998-99. a 70% increase in five years !) It is also expected to play a key role in the sharing of resources within the Atlantic Scholarly Network Information (ASIN), another recent initiative of CAUL.



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
