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GATES DONATES PCs AND SOFTWARE TO ATLANTIC PUBLIC LIBRARIES

By now, most people are aware that Bill Gates', ex-CEO of Microsoft, has donated well over a million dollars worth of hardware, software and support expenses to public libraries in the Atlantic provinces through his philanthropic organization, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Last October, I was part of a group of librarians and computer support workers to travel to Seattle to learn more about this gift.

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation (www.gatesfoundation.org) is the most recent name for the organization formerly known at the Gates Library Initiative or the Gates Learning Foundation. The organization distributes philanthropy to a variety of health and education causes espoused by the Gates, one of which is public libraries. The stated purpose of the grants is to help bridge the "digital divide", that is, the gap between the rich and the poor vis-a-vis access to computers. As of October, 1999, the Foundation had made grants to over 1.300 public libraries in 28 U.S. states. The Foundation expects to complete its work in all 50 states by 2003 and is just beginning to look at international expansion. Canada is the first "foreign" country to receive Gates grants.

The session in October included representatives from Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia. Many of us were not very clear why we had been brought to Seattle at the beginning of the week. The U.S. program had been up and running for some time now,

although I didn't know much about it. However, many of the initial meetings that week were spent going over the way that the program had rolled out in the United States and how Canada would be different. Although the BMGF had dealt directly with individual libraries in many of the states, their intention here was to work through the provincial agencies responsible for libraries. The BMGF had sent trainers to each individual library to install the computers and to train the library staff, but, for Canada, that responsibility would belong to the province. For that purpose, funds for training labs were being included with each province's grant.

So what exactly is included in the grant? Staff of the BMGF took a look at statistics for each province provided by National Welfare Council's Poverty Profile 1996 to determine locations with existing public libraries where more than 17.6% of the population fell below the poverty line. These communities were eligible to receive a certain number of public access stations and content servers, depending on the population served.

The PCs are high-end multimedia Pentiums - the exact specifications won't be known until the machines are actually built. The grant also provides for software - some of the titles provided are the Encarta Reference Suite, Encarta Africana, applications such as MS Word 2000, Powerpoint and Publisher as well as a number of children's educational software such as Arthur, Barney and Magic Schoolbus titles as well as a variety from the Learning Company. For French workstations, the software is more limited but includes the French version of Encarta and the Larousse Bibliorom. Printers are included as well as a fair amount of documentation including a training binder with transparencies used by their staff in the U.S. program.

The initial part of the week in Seattle was spent going over the formalities - the application process, the time lines involved, how the program had worked in the existing U.S. sites, how the Canadian program would differ and getting to know the individuals involved. The remainder of the week saw the group split into two sections - trainers and technical support - with sessions directed at those two areas. One of the main differences between the Canadian and U.S. versions of the program is that the Canadian provinces are expected to assume the responsibility of providing training and technical support for public library

staff whereas, in the U.S., the Foundation staff provided all the initial training and support. To this end, the Canadian program also will include a Help Desk workstation identical to the PCs in the libraries to allow the Help Desk staff to better troubleshoot problems.

The Foundation headquarters in Seattle consists of a spacious and well-appointed training facility on the ground floor and the actual offices and work areas on the second floor. For part of the week, we shared the training facility with a group of Floridians but, for most of the time, the 60 or so Canadians were together which allowed us to meet colleagues from other provinces as far away as British Columbia. With conference and travel funds so limited in public libraries, we don't often get that kind of opportunity and the networking and contacts were a valuable side-benefit of the



The week was quite intensive - we were picked up at the hotel by a shuttle bus beginning at about 7:30 a.m. (or we could walk - the distance between the hotel and the training centre wasn't that great and the weather was mild and not too wet despite rumours of the annual Seattle Rain Festival from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31) and we usually finished between 4:30 and 5 in the afternoon. However, the week finished off with a "Snappy Hour" on Friday for the whole group along with the BMGF staff - food, drink and a ceremony complete with certificates gifts. parting Holman, Director of the P.E.I.

Provincial Library Service and Chair of the Provincial and Territorial Library Directors Council, made some concluding remarks, noting they had been working with the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation for almost two years and that all Canadian libraries shared the Foundation's vision of libraries as a method of narrowing the digital divide.

Most of us left Seattle early the next morning to return to the realities of our daily work. However, by the time you are reading this article, some provinces will be actually receiving the equipment from this grant program and the exciting work of providing and promoting free public Internet access will be beginning. Let the games begin!

NEW LOCATIONS / DÉMÉNAGEMENTS:

As of February 1, the Advanced Education part of the new amalgamated Department of Education Library is officially in its new building at Place 2000 on King Street in Fredericton.

She assumes her new duties February 21, 2000. Ms. Nadeau will continue to carry some of her duties in the Chaleur Region. Her team in Chaleur will assume additional duties.

Ms. Nadeau received a Bachelor's degree in Communications from the University Quebec of at Montreal in 1981 and her MBSI from the Universite de Montreal in 1984. Ms. Nadeau has utilized her training in both disciplines throughout her career.

The Haut-Saint-Jean Region's bookmobile begins automated circulation, as adapted for the bookmobiles, in February. At this point, only two bookmobiles are outstanding in our plan to move to 100% automated circulation.

YORK LIBRARY REGION:

Fireside Book Sale:

York's Fireside Book Sale held the end of January raised \$2,200 for the library. Staff started the mini-sale several years ago as a way to clear a space in the overflowing storage room. "People are always so generous with their donations," said librarian Geraldine Stanway, one of the organizers of the regional library's two annual book sales, "that by mid-year we have more than enough for our gigantic June book sale which fills the local armoury. The question then is where to put the overflow? We decided we weren't

going to pay for additional storage, so putting the books up for sale seemed like a good solution. We were pleasantly surprised at the public's response and at how many books we moved in just one day and an evening. They literally went out of the library in boxes." This is the third year York has held the Fireside Book Sale

News from the bookmobile:

A horrid smell greeted York staff when they came to work early January 27. They followed their noses to the bus bay only to discover that about five gallens of diesel fuel had leaked from bookmobile, that drainage pipe under the bus couldn't handle the spill, and that the fuel was inches deep on the floor of the bay. Who you gonna call? The local fire department! They arrived in record time and the clean up was under control almost instantly. Mike McKinley, driver of the bookmobile that serves York, Sunbury and Queens counties, said that the fuel pump and hoses had just let go in the aging vehicle. Unfortunately parts had to be ordered from Montreal; the bus was off the road for two days while it was being repaired.

PUBLIC LIBRARIES:

The Provincial Public Library Board was recently given a one time cash infusion of \$1,000,000 from the Provincial Government for use in the purchase of new books. This sum was given to the Board as part of a governmental initiative to promote reading and to foster literacy.

Public libraries in the province have also been the beneficiaries of funding from the Gates initiative. \$1,000,000 was donated for the purchase of computer hardware and for training; another \$239,000 was donated for software

Recent events in the St. John's area have included readings by authors Agnes Walsh and Carmelita McGrath, and a series of financial seminars on RRSP's, estate planning, and taxation.

Victoria Murphy has been seconded from her position as Lending Services Librarian in the St. Johns' Public Libraries to conduct staff computer training as part of the Gates Library Initiative.

At the time of writing, The Provincial Information and Library Resources Board was looking for a new Executive Director. The competition, which was open to members of the provincial Public Service, closed on March 31, 2000.

Newfoundland The and Labrador Library Association continued to plan Newfoundland and Labrador Library Week 2000, its annual celebration of books, libraries, reading, and literacy. Gates Foundation

The Cape Breton Regional Library is excited to have the opportunity to benefit from the Gates Foundation's gift to the Nova Scotia Provincial Library. CBRL is in the process of partnering with various local community groups, and is making arrangements for space at the McConnell Library to house the regional training centre.

CBRL Celebrates 50 Years

The year 2000 marks a milestone for the Cape Breton Regional Library. It is our fiftieth anniversary. Thanks to the efforts of community leaders such a J.J. Tompkins and others, the Regional Library was established. On August 31, 1950 the Cape Breton Regional Headquarters and Sydney Branch Library were officially opened. By December of the same year branches were opened Dominion, Glace in Louisbourg, New Waterford, North Sydney and the Cape Breton County Bookmobile. Today we have 13 branches and two bookmobiles in our system.

A committee comprised of three Cape Breton Regional staff and three Board members is busy planning celebrations and activities. A bookmark, highlighting important dates in CBRL's history, has been produced and is being offered to all staff and patrons. Much fun was had at our first of many planned open houses! In March Open Houses were held in Victoria North and Sydney Mines. We look forward to meeting members and the public at open houses to be held in Florence on April 15, 2000 and on May 4, 2000. Each CBRL branch will host an open house, the largest of which is scheduled for Sydney on Sunday, October 1, 2000.

New Reference/Information Area

As of the first of December 1999, Reference/Information at

the Cape Breton Regional Library has been designated a separate department. Managed by Mr. Donald Ward, the Reference Area is now physically set apart from our Circulation Desk. This new arrangement enhances Donald's ability to provide reference service patrons and staff.

In April, the Cape Breton Regional Library is holding it's second annual Library Card Month. To coincide with Library Card Month, we are introducing a newly designed library card. The plastic library card is another step on the road to becoming fully automated. The library, in partnership with the Cape Breton Post, will be holding special events, promotions and contests to highlight the wealth of information available from the public library. Theresa MacDonald and Lisa Mulak will visit Grade four classes throughout the Municipality to promote Library Card Month as well as

the resources and activities available at the Cape Breton Regional Library. Several prizes, to be drawn at the end of the month, will be won by one lucky baby, one lucky child, and one lucky adult! The adult prize is a year's subscription to the Cape Breton Post. To receive a ballot for the prize, simply register as a new member, renew your membership, or for current library members, bring in friends and family members interested in registering during April. Last year we had more than 1300 people obtain registrations during April. This year our goal is 1100. To help us, the municipal councils of both Cape Breton and Victoria Counties have declared April as Library Card Month.

NEWS FROM EASTERN COUNTIES REGIONAL LIBRARY

Rural Library Service

Since January 2000, the look of rural library services has changed dramatically at Eastern Counties Regional Library. Library patrons no longer see the blue and white bookmobiles going down the road, stopping at local community centres or at householders' stops. With the sudden breakdown of the bookmobiles, library staff were quick to face the challenge and seek new, albeit temporary, means for continuing rural service delivery. As of January, Library staff were back in the communities, visiting with patrons, bringing them a selection of books, videos, etc. and a cheery word. Staff set up wherever there was an available space, in schools, CAP sites and community halls.

In Mabou, on a stormy winter

evening, library staff greeted patrons in the bingo hall, just before the big game. Snow covered library patrons came in with their backpacks filled with books, videos and magazines, eager to choose new materials for those long winter evenings. In Judique, an elderly gentleman explained how, now that the bookmobile was retired, it was maybe time for him to return his library card. Fading eyesight was making it difficult for him to read and he couldn't get out as much in the winter months. The bookmobile won't be stopping at his home anymore but he is now linked in to our Talking Books service and is 'reading' more than ever. In Ecum Secum, our homebound service delivers library materials to seniors who can't make it to the nearest library branch. In L'Ardoise, people are coming in to meet a library staff member at the local CAP site for training on the NcompasS library catalogue and to pick up requested materials. In Port Hood, elementary school teachers are busy looking up information on their school computer after receiving a training session on the Infotrac reference databases. In Inverness, the community will be gathering at the local Miners' Museum for an evening with Sheldon Currie. sponsored by the library.

Our library patrons miss the bookmobiles but what they want most are library services in their small, remote communities. They value the access to knowledgeable staff and reading and information resources which they had on the bookmobile. Local organizations and library patrons have all shown a great willingness to work with the library to find new ways to provide rural library services and with their help, the library will continue to be an active commu-

nity partner, linking Eastern Counties' rural communities in an informed and vital network.

work stations and one instructor station. The desks have arrived and the wiring, paid for by the Yarmouth Public Library & Museum, is now in place. Systems Administrator, Scott MacMullen, and Automation Technician, Verna DeViller have been spending the bulk of their days getting the computers set up. It's hoped the computer lab will be ready for a mid-June opening with an official launch set for September.

Braille Day at Western Counties

WCRL, in conjunction with the Canadian National Institute for the Blind (CNIB), hosted an Open House celebrating Braille Day at the Yarmouth branch on Wed. Feb. 9th. Braille Day, held during White Cane Week, provides an opportunity for the library and the CNIB to further their partnership in promoting services available from both organizations for the sight impaired.

The CNIB distributed braille rulers, book markers, and brochures during the Open House and a video on Louis Braille was shown. A display of large print books and a demonstration of how to use talking books was an integral part of the open house. Visitors also learned how to use the reader-magnifier available at the library.

Adopt-A-Book 2000

The third Adopt-A-Book campaign is slated to start the first week of April. Organizers are busy planning a musical kick-off for the event. The goal for *Adopt-A-Book 2000* is to surpass the 1998 campaign, sponsored by CJLS, which resulted in 1536 book adopted. The campaign, held every two years, will run from April to June.

End of An Era ...

The last of the card catalogues were removed from WCRL Headquarters on January 13th. As we begin the new millennium this event closed a chapter in WCRL's history and punctuates the new way of carrying out day-to-day business at all libraries across the province and the country.

Heart Health Nova Scotia Partnership Update

The Partnership recognises important role public libraries and CAP sites can play in the delivery of consumer health information to the public. Although this phase of the project is focussed on the Western Health Region, the long term goal of the project is to become a province-wide initiative. The Ncompass Extranet Project

The NcompasS Extranet project is being developed by Rodney Tucker at the Nova Scotia Provincial Library. This Extranet is similar to an Intranet, and will be available to any regional library staff person who has access to a computer. Many businesses and corporations have used this technology to provide better access to information for their clients. The Extranet will require a password to allow some staff to update and delete information such as staff and policy changes, but it will allow all staff to search the site.

The Extranet will contain information such as: a searchable staff directory (including Email and phone numbers); policies and procedures that can be down loaded and submitted online: a reference database of questions answered at the Provincial Library; a discussion board to provide another communication tool for staff: and other aspects that staff will find helpful. The Extranet is scheduled to be accessible by the end of February and all regional library staff are encouraged to provide ideas to keep the Extranet current and useful.

Pictou-Antigonish Regional Library Visit

User Services Coordinator Michael Colborne spent a day in December visiting with staff at the Pictou-Antigonish Regional Library (PARL). He met with the Management Team to discuss local issues and potential areas of cooperation and support. During the day, he was able to visit five PARL branches, including the CAP (Community Access Program) site in the River John branch. Over the next few months Michael hopes to visit other regions as well.

South Shore Regional Library Visit

On March 2, Michael Colborne spent the day visiting branches of the South Shore Regional Library, with Regional Librarian Janet Clark and SSRL Bernadette board member Schmid, Libraries in Lunenburg, Bridgewater, and Liverpool were included in the visit, as well as Headquarters SSRL in Hebbville and a mobile library.

Training Notes

Staff in the User Services Section of the Provincial Library conducted one training workshop in December 1999, Job Scarching on the Web, for seven staff members of the Colchester-East Hants Regional Library in Truro. In January 2000, one session was held on *Introduction to* HTML for five staff. The second vear Library Technician Program class from the Halifax Campus, Nova Scotia Community College toured the Provincial Library facility on January 27 and talked with staff about their job descriptions and duties.

Videoconferences Offered

On January 14, 2000, the Nova Scotia Provincial Library provided viewing of the video conference entitled: Internet Power: How to Get it How to Keep it How to Pass it On, aired by College of DuPage, Glen Ellyn, IL. The conference focussed on developing searching competency on the Internet. Presenter, Bill Erbes, discussed the major features of each of the most widely used search engines and directories and reviewed topics such as safe-surfing browsers for children and what is meant by terms like spamming. The 40 member audience viewed the conference as beneficial to a

broad range of Internet users, whether searching for answers to reference questions, finding cataloguing copy, or conducting research. Visit the website at http://www.dupage.edu/soaring/forfurth.html for materials.

Teleconference Information Power: What is it. How to know it when you see it, How to use it in your library took place on March 24, 2000. Thirty-one audience members at the Provincial Library downlink site heard from library staff from a variety of work environments. Practical tips for empowering library staff and increasing their visibility in the workplace were explored. Personal, professional and technical core competencies for library support staff were discussed and the importance of creating and maintaining a professional portfolio was stressed. A demonstration was given of three security software programs for public access computers (Fortres, WinSelect and Window Washer). Hackmatack Children's Choice Book Award Update

Two more milestones in the Hackmatack Award process have been reached over the last week. A successful grant application was made to the Canada Council for the Arts, Writing and Publishing Section. Notification was received of a \$7,000 grant to be used for the author tours and the event planned as the finale of the first ever award. The author tours will take place in

the week of May 15, 2000 and the Award Ceremony will be held on Saturday, May 20, 2000 Alderney Landing the Theatre, which has a website at http://easternfront.ns.sympatico.ca. Secondly, while the original target for registered reading groups for the first year was 250. each (20)groups from Newfoundland, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and remainder from Nova Scotia), to date there are 435 registered reading groups. In an optimistic move 500 reading kits were printed in September! Only a few remain since some have been used as promotional material and as samples given to funding supporters.

Street Smart 9 to 5

A two-day Street Smart 9 to 5 training program was presented to 14 staff members from Nova Scotia regional libraries. Donna Hendy. Training Development Consultant with the Department of Education's Human Resources Division. facilitated the program. Street Smart 9 to 5 helps people develop the skills required to defuse and avoid violence in the workplace, whether from other employees or members of the public. This program was developed by the Crisis Prevention Institute at http://www.crisisprevention.com.

Many regional public library staff work on public service desks, and such skills can be useful. This training session was set up to give selected staff an opportunity to evaluate the value of such sessions for other staff. If there is sufficient interest in this training, it could be worthwhile developing Street Smart trainers from within the library community. A one day version of the Street Smart training will be presented at the

NSLA conference at White Point Beach in October.

Nova Scotia's Summer Reading Programme Update

This Nova Scotia Summer Reading Programme 2000 (SRP) theme is Sail Away With Books/Cap Sur La Lecture. There will be a Kick Off Week media event aboard either the Highlander or the Bluenose. As a SRP midsummer prize, a tour aboard one of the Tallships for a child and caregiver from each region has been arranged for Saturday July 22. Discussions regarding additional tours are taking place with confirmation of details by May 1, 2000. The Summer Reading Programme Committee has obtained permission to use the Tallships 2000 logo, with a waiver of the 15% license fee and will be displaying SRP posters at Tallships 2000 venues.

Staffing Notes

Michael Purcell joined the Technical Services group at Nova Scotia Provincial Library as the Automation Specialist on March 20 replacing Johanna previously Mike Cooper. worked for McInnes Cooper as a network analyst. Prior to that he worked in the computer services department of the Burlington Public Library. Mike is looking forward to seeing Nova Scotia outside of South End Halifax. Shirley MacLeod began April as Assistant Automation Specialist replacing Michael Vandenburg. Shirley recently completed a year long position as Media Librarian for Learning Resources & Technology. Prior to that, she was at the Halifax Nova Scotia Campus, Community College where she worked as a librarian and as an Library Instructor in the Technician Program. Michael

Vandenburg left on March 31 to move to Philadelphia. He saw most of the regional branch libraries during his work time at Nova Scotia Provincial Library and will be missed for his dedication to all of his projects.

Training Notes

Inter-Library Loan Workshop

Twenty-one staff from the Nova Scotia Provincial Library and public regional libraries attended an ILL workshop on March 20 at the Nova Scotia Provincial Library. It was an useful opportunity for interlibrary loan (ILL) staff from across the province to share ideas and experiences. Topics discussed included Library Book Rate, copyright and genealogy requests. It will be useful for the group to meet again once all the regions are automated. Some activities generated by this meeting include standard statistics forms and ILL software.

Directory of Nova Scotia Libraries

The most up-to-date and comprehensive listing of libraries and archival institutions is now available. The Directory of Nova Scotia Libraries 2000 provides a listing of over 280 library, archival and related institutions in Nova Scotia. Entries provide comprehensive data including subjects collected, hours, key staff names, mailing address, telephone, fax, e-mail address, website address and interlibrary loan information. Detailed appendices provide additional information.

Libraries which are full deposit or selective deposit libraries under the Nova Scotia Government document distribution system are eligible to receive one print copy of this directory, free of charge. Academic:

Holland College librarian Brenda Brady and Andrea Stewart will be spending much of their summer moving library collections across Charlottetown. Holland College is moving many of their programs from the Royalty Centre campus to the Charlottetown Centre campus of the college and this means many weeks of packing and unpacking for the staff.

School libraries:

The Department of Education has sent the draft of a new Ministerial directive and standards concerning the Island's school libraries out for consultation with the educational community. If approved, the two documents would strengthen the

commitment from the educational community to school libraries by ensuring an adequate level of staffing and collections. In addition, a joint departmental/teacher-librarian committee has been struck to examine ways to help teacher-librarians with the selection process. The committee will investigate using the Web as a means of recommending titles to teacher-librarians for inclusion in school libraries.

The Department of Education is providing school libraries across the province with a multimedia Pentium computer to run the Windows 95 version of the school library automation program, MicroCAT. Computers should be in place for the next school year.

Public libraries:

The PEI Provincial Library Service is pleased to welcome Allan Groen as the new PEI Provincial Librarian. Mr. Groen comes to P.E.I. from Saskatchewan where he has been the Director of the Parklands Regional Library system. Mr. Groen takes up his new duties on May 1, 2000.

French Awareness Week took place from April 9 - 15 and included many activities at various public libraries across the province. The Bibliotheque publique d'Abram Village hosted a session on gardening and, happily, it did not snow.

At the time of writing, the public access PCs from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation have just begun to arrive in Charlottetown. Staff are busy unpacking and configuring these computers which should be out to selected public libraries from Tignish in the west to Souris in the eastern part of P.E.I. by June.

1999/2000 ANNUAL REPORTS

1999-2000 APLA President's Report:

APLA Committees and Executive met October 23 and 24, in Halifax, Nova Scotia. Meetings were in the Sobey building on the campus of Saint Mary s University. Through the rest of the year the Executive has been able to conduct business very successfully by e-mail and telephone.

Arranging events for the visit of the National Librarian, Roch Carrier, was a highlight of APLA's activities. Round table discussions and issues forums were held in Halifax, Charlottetown, St. John's and Moncton, in November and December 1999. APLA Vice Presidents coordinated these events in 2 of the 4 cities visited. APLA provided funding and assistance in each city, and made representations to the National Librarian at each event.

The issue of cooperation and coordination with other library organizations has been discussed by the Executive. This year an APLA observer attended the NSLA board meeting, at NSLA's request. APLA and NSLA have agreed to exchange Executive minutes. Exchange of minutes and board attendance has been offered to the other Atlantic library associations as well. Co-ordination issues have been discussed with PTLAC (Provincial and Territorial Library Association

Council) and with CLA.

A test database was constructed at Saint Mary's University to explore the idea of using web access to improve the administration of the APLA membership database. Despite the promise of this test, an APLA membership computer will continue to be needed. The APLA desktop computer is clearly reaching the end of its useful life. This Windows 3.1 computer is no longer able to run the latest software. An updated desktop computer would continue to be difficult to transfer to future membership convenors, or to bring to APLA conferences, etc. So the Executive has agreed to budget for a new portable membership computer. This recommendation will be part of the budget proposal for the coming year.

Desktop publishing specialist Michael Vandenburg was contracted to provide designs for new APLA promotional pamphlets. Michael has provided proof designs. Further development of these materials will continue in the coming year.

After a discussion of possible mentoring activities, a program to introduce and orient new conference attendees will be tried at this year's APLA conference.

The following events received General Activity Fund grants and APLA support during the year.

• Teleconference on Electronic License Negotiation, sponsored by CASLIS Atlantic and others, October 1999.

- Book Repair for Front Line Workers, sponsored by Wallaceburg Bookbinding and APLA in Moncton, Halifax and St John s.
- Newfoundland and Labrador Library Association Library Training Day. Day long conference of library training sessions will be offered for the first time by the NLLA, in St. John's.
- Newfoundland and Labrador Library Association. Library Week. Passport Reading Program.
- Hackmatack Children's Choice Book Award. Over 300 groups of grade school children from the 4 Atlantic Provinces took part in the first annual Hackmatack Award selection. APLA has agreed to a GAF grant for the Award's 2nd year.

I wish to thank all members of the executive for their excellent efforts over the past year. In particular, I would like to say thanks to Stephen Field who is finishing his term as Vice President for Newfoundland, Francesco Lai, who completes his term as Past President, and Penny Logan who was been a terrific help as APLA Secretary. I look forward to carrying on with many of the things we have started in the coming year as Past President.

1999-2000 Annual Report -Vice-President, New Brunswick

New Brunswick hosted the 1999 APLA conference in Saint John. A wide range of topics brought interesting and inspiring sessions to the participants.

As of February 21, 2000, Sylvie Nadeau has been appointed Acting Executive Director of NBLS and Provincial Librarian. She also continues to carry some of her duties as Regional Director of the Chaleur Library Region. Her predecessor, Jocelyne Thompson, has taken up duties as the Head of Collections and Public Services at the University of New Brunswick. The public libraries are now under the Department of Education, following the reorganization of the Lord government, effective since April 1, 2000.

During the Summer of 1999, Moncton hosted visitors from around the world who had come to join the delegates at the Francophone Summit. A special grant from the province enabled the public library system to purchase books on the participating countries. A major exhibit, in collaboration with the Swiss Consulat, featured the works of writer and photographer Nicolas Bouvier at the Moncton Public Library. La Bibliothèque Campus d'Edmundston l'Université de Moncton a été l'hôtesse d'une exposition touchant les nouvelles technologies de l'information et de communication; elle s'inscrivait dans le cadre du colloque Initiatives 99 lui-même intégré au huitième Sommet de la francophonie.

La Fondation des bibliothèques publiques du Nouveau-Brunswick continue ses efforts. Une première tranche de 50,000 \$ a permis l'achat de livres pour jeunes. Another \$50,000 was put in the collections of the public library system through the Environmental Trust Fund.

New computers will soon be arriving in all parts of New Brunswick through the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Each of the five library regions is now planning for a training laboratory and 36 individual libraries will receive a total of 83 Internet accesses.

All public libraries are now on-line and, at this point, only two bookmobiles are outstanding in the plan to move to 100% automation.

Le 1er février 2000, la Bibliothèque publique Mgr. W. J. Conway d Edmundston a déménagé dans de nouvelles installations spacieuses, modernes et fonctionnelles. The St. Croix Public Library also has a new location, which offers more space for programs and meetings. As well, the Advanced Education part of the new amalgamated Department of Education Library is now officially in its new building Place 2000 Fredericton.

The Department of Education is in negotiation for a provincial support agreement for the schools using the Follett automation system. The Follett software has also been adopted at some Community Colleges to circulate materials.

L'exécutif de l'ABPNB s'est fait l'instigateur d'une rencontre auprès de l'UNB pour discuter du cours d'aide bibliothécaire qui n'est plus offert.

As APLA Vice-President for New Brunswick perhaps the most interesting activity that I have been involved with has been the planning of the round table with the new National Librarian, Roch Carrier. has enabled me to meet and work with interesting people as librarians from school, community colleges and university libraries joined other librarians from across the province to meet and discuss various issues with Roch Carrier during his visit in Moncton.

On a personal basis, I was able to familiarize myself with the Association and meeting members of the Executive, getting to know them mostly through e-mail contacts. By reporting to the APLA Bulletin, following up on lapsed memberships and coordinating a "First Aid for Books" workshop, I was in frequent contact with many library staff in New Brunswick.

1999-2000 Annual Report: Vice-President, Newfoundland

The 1999-2000 year has been a very active one on a number of fronts, and my duties as APLA Vice-President for Newfoundland have kept me reasonably busy during the year. I have, of course, continued to contribute my "News from the Provinces" column to the APLA Bulletin, and I attended the Fall 1999 executive meeting in Halifax.

In December, I organized the visit to St. John's of Roch the new National Carrier, Librarian, M. Carrier and his colleague from the National Library, Karen McGrath, were given tours of a public library (the A.C. Hunter Library) and a university library (Memorial University's Queen Elizabeth II Library). They also took part in a library issues discussion forum, which I chaired and for which there were four presenters: Adriana Popescu (Information Centre - CISTI's Institute of Marine Dynamics), Janet Fraser (College of the North Atlantic), Judy Anderson (Acting Executive Director - Provincial Information and Library Resources Board) and Vicki Pennell (Former Learning Resource Co-ordinator for the Avalon Consolidated School Board, and Past-President of the Association of Teacher Librarians in Canada). APLA contributed \$100.00 towards the cost of a reception hosted by Richard Ellis. University Librarian Memorial at University. The visit seemed to

generate a substantial amount of interest within the library community, and all events were well attended. M. Carrier and Ms. McGrath indicated that they had received useful information to take back to Ottawa, and they seemed glad to hear about local concerns and to receive suggestions on the future role of the National Library.

I am currently organizing the visit of Wallaceburg Book-binding's Ron Riedstra to the St. John's area for the New-foundland edition of his "First Aid for Books" workshop. The date for the session is April 17, 2000. I have a venue for the session, and the number of people who have indicated interest in attending is reasonably high. From all indications, it promised to be an interesting and informative presentation.

During the year I maintained liaison with the executive of the Newfoundland and Labrador Library Association (NLLA). I am happy to report that the APLA executive was able to secure GAF funding to support two very useful NLLA projects: \$300.00 was given to the NLLA's "Newfoundland and Labrador Week 2000" project, and another \$250.00 was given to the NLLA in support of its inaugural conference. The money was used for honoraria for 5 conference presenters.

Earlier this year, I received a request for the APLA to provide GAF funding for the Access 2000 conference to be held this Fall in St. John's. At the time of writing, the APLA Executive had not made a decision concerning this request. Another decision by the Executive regarding a request for funding, this time from the

APLA Memorial Awards Fund, is also pending at the time of this report.

On the membership front, I contacted lapsed members about renewing their membership. This met with some success. I also contacted others about becoming new members. I attempted to target for membership those students enrolled in Memorial University's Library Certificate Program, but this did not meet with success.

As this is the end of my two year term as APLA Vice-President for Newfoundland, I want to take this opportunity to thank all of my colleagues on the APLA Executive, past and present. They have been a wonderful group to work with.

1999-2000 Annual Report: Vice-President, Nova Scotia

NovaKnowledge's Economy Report Card for 1999 indicates more people use computers in Nova Scotian libraries than in libraries elsewhere in Canada. Halifax is second only to Ottawa for the highest percentage of computer use in libraries and schools. NovaKnowledge's report card is prepared to evaluate and review Nova Scotia's participation in the knowledge-based economy. This report makes it very clear that our libraries are enabling Nova Scotians to acquire some of the skills required to work and live in this new economy.

Just as our patrons need new skills, library workers do as well! Professional development is becoming increasingly important in this era of technology. The Nova Scotia Provincial Library is a leader in this area. Two examples of video conference recently offered by our Provincial Library include, "Internet power: how to get it, how to keep it. how to pass it on" and "Information power: what is it, how to know it when you see it, how to use it in your library".

I am always amazed at the activity which takes place in cur public libraries. Promotions, books sales, and "Adopt-a-Book" campaigns are often necessary in order to operate during diffieconomic times Counties Western Regional Library excels in this area. WCRL has successfully marketed Volume II of their Come to Supper cookbook and have, with support from their community, spearheaded other innovative fundraising activities.

In the past year Novanet, the consortium of academic libraries, has undertaken a new planning process. Novanet has implemented two previous plans, the last being developed in 1997-1999. In December, 75 representatives from all member libraries gathered to discuss guiding principles, actions, and objectives as stipulated in Draft II, Novanet Plan 2000-2002. In November 1998, the Nova Scotia Community College joined the Novanet Consortium. This has been a very busy year for the College as it develops its new Learning Resource Service. The NSCC Learning Resource Service ensures the 13 NSCC campuses have both the staff and facilities to meet the information needs of students and staff.

In 1999, the Nova Scotia Provincial Library released its first library advocacy video, "Libraries: where the future begins". At its premiere. Minister of Education and Culture, Wayne Gaudet addressed members of the Library Board Association of Nova Scotia and acknowledged the important role board members and trustees play as advocates for their libraries. The video focuses on the expanding role of libraries in the community and shares with the audience how libraries have adapted technology to enhance services.

In October, APLA, in association with Wallaceburg Bookbinding, sponsored the book repair workshop, "First Aid for Books". Response to the workshop was very positive and we hope to provide similar offerings in the future.

As Vice-President for Nova Scotia, my activities have included reporting the news as provided by my colleagues; performing duties as prescribed by the Executive, and contacting lapsed or non-renewing members. Each of us can play a role in developing a healthy membership for our Association. Let your colleagues know the benefits you derive from being an APLA member!

Our APLA Executive is very energetic and dedicated! It is a privilege to work along side these fine individuals! Many thanks to my colleagues who so willingly report noteworthy events and news. As alluded to, it is a revelation to learn of all

the activities taking place in our libraries! Sharing and communicating is essential to the continued development of our libraries. To our volunteers chairing committees and interest groups a hearty appreciation is extended. As an Antigonisher and a St. FXU alumna, I welcome you to our beautiful town and campus. The new Provincial Librarian, Allan Groen, will take up his position on May 1, 2000. The provincial system also received a number of public access computers donated by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

In school library news, three Island schools received capital construction and renovation grants from the Department of Education which included significant components for new school library resource material. In addition, the past year saw the

implementation and launch of BIL (Building Information Literacy) (http://www.edu.pe.ca/bil/) as well as the development and distribution of a comprehensive school library handbook.

Robertson Library at the University of Prince Edward Island celebrated its 25th anniversary in its current building this year, shortly after undergoing some renovations and space reallocation last fall.
