Membership has its privileges

On February 3, 2005, the Ontario Library Association graciously hosted a meeting of the Provincial and Territorial Library Associations Council (PTLAC) during the OLA Super Conference in Toronto. In this meeting we exchanged ideas about future collaboration and shared the activities and achievements of our organizations. On February 5, the group met with members of CLA's Executive Council to create a better

mechanism for communication and cooperation between the groups. CLA Executive Director Don Butcher announced that presidents of all the provincial

and territorial library associations would receive free CLA memberships and registration to the Calgary conference in order to facilitate continued talks.

The Partnership

In 1998 the Ontario Library Association restructured its organization to enhance and make sustainable the services and programs it provides to its membership. It was agreed in 2004 that OLA share this success by including other provincial associations in the Education Institute and the OLAStore. This new alliance was named "The Partnership." The founding members were BCLA, LAA, OLA and SLA. Both APLA and NSLA have now officially joined The Partnership. The website (www.thepartnership.ca) will be updated shortly to reflect our participation.

Benefits of membership:

The Education Institute offers our members teleconferences, webcasts, workshops and professional development opportunities at member rates. Teleconferences and webcasts can be done at any location across the country, at home or at work. There is no limit on listeners per location and the price

includes all bridging and long distance costs. Professional opportunities vary in price and format. For example, a teleconference is \$48 and a

two-day workshop \$189, compared to \$68 and \$249 respectively for non-members. Although the member rate has always been offered to APLA members, we were not able to participate in the revenue-sharing aspect of The Partnership. Now that we have joined, APLA will receive \$12 of the \$48 fee paid by every APLA member who participates in a teleconference. For other sessions the revenue generated will be about 12% of the fee.

The Education Institute can provide opportunities for our members to develop their own teleconferences or webcasts and APLA can promote workshops and conferences in the Atlantic region through the Institute's printed catalogue and the website. An added bonus is that developers of teleconferences are paid a flat rate of \$200. Identification and

development of regional workshops, teleconferences and webcasts will be coordinated by the Continuing Education Interest Group. Please contact Jennifer Richard or Heather Sanderson, the convener of the Continuing Education Interest Group, for more information.

Other benefits of The Partnership:

The idea of collaboration on a peer-reviewed e-journal was introduced at the PTLAC meeting. Such a journal would be electronic only and would not interfere with association publications such as the *APLA Bulletin*. This e-journal would publish both theoretical and practical/applied articles pertaining to all types of libraries. As a member institution, APLA members would be able to submit articles and would also have representation on the editorial board and/or the peer review.

Reciprocal conference registration rates are a condition of The Partnership. APLA members can now attend OLA or BCLA or NSLA at the member price, without being members of those associations.

Collaboration with the OLAStore is an additional feature. APLA publications or products could be sold or distributed through the OLAStore, and OLA will help APLA create our own store brand. The APLAStore would be featured at our conference. As with the Education Institute, there is a revenue-sharing aspect to this initiative as well.

From St. Jer@me's Den

What do James Murray, Greer Garson, and David Shulman have in common? OK, so this one is a bit of a stretch, but they all had, or played someone who had, an interest in words.

When David Shulman died on 30 October 2004, the Oxford English Dictionary (OED) lost one of its most ardent contributors and watchdogs. In the preface to the 2nd edition of the OED (1989), the editors noted that "during the span of the project [to produce the edition], the files of the Oxford Dictionaries Department continued to benefit from the labours of the directed readers, the material submitted by voluntary readers, and the resources of independently compiled collections." David Shulman was in the list of those acknowledged as making a contribution. Shulman's contributions have been recognized in all subsequent editions including the online version. In the November 7, 2004 New York Times obituary, Jesse Sheidlower, the current editor-at-large of the OED, is reported as saying that few contributors were more prolific than Shulman and that fewer still possessed his knack for sending usable material.

Depending upon the source of your information about Shulman, he either singly or in

collaboration with others traced the origin of thousands of words including doozy, hot dog, jazz, and shyster. And to what did he attribute his success in the guest for the origin of so many words? Shulman, a self-described "literary Sherlock Holmes," credited his success to patience and the existence of the New York Public Library. He haunted the rare books collection of the library, working his way through pulp novels, trade magazines, and old copies of the Police Gazette seeking original uses of words as well as variations in spelling and meaning. Shulman's obituary in the Times online relates a story of how "he once spent months ransacking old issues of *Delicatessen*, the defunct trade paper. to disprove the validity of a rare spelling of 'pastrami' in Webster's."

In addition to being a word sleuth, Shulman had worked as a cryptanalyst for the United States Army, a puzzle compiler, and an author. He was an avid collector of American ephemera including 20,000 postcards. He donated his collection of cryptographic material and ephemera to the New York Public Library.

[This is for those of you who are interested in establishing the "word connections" of James

Murray and Greer Garson. Murray was the first editor of the *Oxford English Dictionary*. In a breathless scene from *Adventure* (1945) Garson, as librarian Emily Sears, educates Clark Gable on the dictionary meaning of "it."]

Library Managers and Directors in the Albert-Westmorland-Kent Library Region attended a meeting at regional headquarters on January 7. The meeting featured a presentation titled "Boys and Learning" which offered information on gender differences in the learning patterns of children and young adults and suggestions for ways to encourage boys to read more.

CHILDHOOD LITERACY / ALPHABÉTISATION DES ENFANTS

Children that started kindergarten in the Fall of 2004 received a public library card. This is in addition to the cards that were sent to every public school student in the Spring of 2004. This initiative, which is part of the Government of New Brunswick's Quality Learning Agenda, aims to encourage youth and their parents to use the resources and programs offered by public libraries and bookmobiles. We are continuing to analyse the success of the "A library card for every public school student" project. As of December 31, 2004, roughly 10% of the cards that were distributed have been activated (11,190).

PUBLIC LIBRARIES

Annapolis Valley Regional Library

Automated Library System

Sirsi and the Nova Scotia Provincial Library have determined that the best possible solution for the

migration of the NcompasS system from MultiLIS to Unicorn is to wait for the next complete version of the software. The new software being developed will accommodate some of the special functions requested by our consortium. These changes will result in better service delivery by our region. Problems experienced in the second test database created will be resolved with this next version. The release date of the software is January, 2005.

It is anticipated that the "live" date for use of the new system will be late spring. A contract calendar will be negotiated when the new software has been tested. Preparations continue for the migration with database cleanup and equipment upgrades. Training and other aspects of the conversion have been tentatively moved to April and May.

Community Access Program (C@P)

The Fall/Winter Youth Internship program provides programming in Windsor, Wolfville, Kentville and Port Williams for a 15-week period ending in mid-March 2005.

Additional C@P funding will be added to the programming budget to provide 10 of the 11 branch locations with programming staff. Programs being offered include one-on-one computer tutorials, pre-school story and craft programs as well as after-school craft programs and kids' computer programs. It is hoped that 2005-2006 C@P funding will allow for the continuation of this programming in the upcoming fiscal year.

Branch Services

The official opening ceremonies at the new Windsor Regional Library were held on November 27 with a capacity crowd in attendance. Patrons and staff are delighted with the new facilities and increased collection size.

During December, several special events were held in our valley libraries:

 Berwick librarian Lynn Silver held a reading of "Twas the Night Before Christmas" in conjunction with the Town's 24th annual Santa Claus celebrations.

- Author, artist and Hockey Heritage Society founder Garth Vaughan was at the Windsor Regional Library on December 1 for a children's reading from his new book Tommy's New Block Skates.
- The Kentville Library hosted a special Holiday Craft Fun session for children on December 10; on the 18th, the library offered "Music of the season" where local musicians shared their love of music with visiting patrons.
- The Rosa M. Harvey Middleton & District Library also hosted special Christmas-themed craft and storytime events for children on December 18.
- The bookmobile serving the eastern part of the Valley participated in the New Minas Santa Claus parade again this year.

We are very excited to announce that our regional library system will be receiving \$9,000 over the next several months to further develop and implement programs that support the provincial "Read to Me!" project. These funds are from the IWK External Grants Program and are the result of a provincially-submitted "Read to Me!" proposal, to which four libraries provided input. This money will allow our three current "Babies & Books" sessions to be extended into the spring and fall and permit training/orientations for staff to implement and assess the baby programs in other branches. \$2,500 will go toward rejuvenating our baby and toddler-age book collection. The infusion of funds will allow us to assess baby programs (new to our region) and develop and adapt future programs accordingly.

CAPE BRETON REGIONAL LIBRARY

On December 4, 2004 the McConnell Library hosted a gathering to celebrate the 75th book published by Breton Books. Breton Books was started in 1986 by Ron Caplan to preserve out-of-print books on Cape Breton's people and history, as well as publish new works. Caplan's influence in preserving the voice of Cape Bretoners goes back to the early 1970s when he published the first issue of *Cape Breton's Magazine*. He explained that his move into publishing books was natural - an exposure over time to books about Cape Breton.

Central Division

Public Library C@P Sites are enjoying a "bumper" crop of training sessions made possible under the latest round of Community Access funding. Youth Interns have been hired for 8-12 weeks to provide basic training to the general public. The demand is high, and the waiting lists are long in some of the larger branches. Manager Pat Parsons states, "training services are fast becoming a staple that the public wants year round, and we are looking at ways to do just that. We'd like to offer the training all the time, but in order to do that, it has to become a line item on our budget. It's as basic now as reference services. " One branch in Central has taken the "Access" Training one step further by providing computer training to seniors in their homes. Now, that's outreach! Parsons notes, "Seniors don't like to come out in the winter with the heavy snow and icy conditions, but they have these spiffy computers that their kids have given them, so they're keen to get online. Bringing our C@P training to them is a wonderful idea, and, in rural areas, it's do-able."

NRC Information Centre St. John's (CISTI)

CISTI Staff in St. John's were recent recipients of a CISTI Award of Excellence for quality service to clients. We also have had a busy few months. The new year finds the Robertson Library as busy as ever, with study areas fully occupied and frequent line-ups at the service desks, while our Library Instruction Centre (LINC) is often jammed almost to overflowing as professors send their students to take advantage of our instructional

program. Yet although the Library building is still heavily used, there are constant demands for more electronic/digital services and resources. Electronic reserves, for example, which were not even offered a few years ago, are now used by dozens of professors. The Library is also, after years of steadily expanding its range of electronic journal and full-text subscriptions, now examining its options in the field of electronic books, having just completed a trial of the ebrary e-book service.

For special collections and other unique content, of course, home-grown solutions are often required, and the Robertson is set to launch PEI PAD, a database indexing locally-published newspapers and periodicals. Thanks are due to Memorial University's Slavko Manjolovich, our own Interim Systems Librarian, Gord Ripley, and to Nicole Greenland, our Systems Coordinator (currently on leave) for their hard work and creativity in making this database a reality.

On the policy and planning front, the Robertson is preparing for an external review, its first since 1992. The composition of the review panel has just been announced, and the details of the review process will be finalized shortly. In contemplating the Robertson's future direction, we should also note the emphasis placed on the Library — and the need to devote sufficient resources to its development — at the official launch of the University's Academic Planning Exercise in late September of last year. Other policy developments include:

- a major revision of the Library's emergency evacuation plan, bringing it into line with new University policies, is now nearing completion.
- as with libraries everywhere, the issue of food and drink in the building poses a perennial challenge here, and we have recently adjusted our policy to allow coffee and other beverages in lidded containers.

NSLA launches mentoring program for Library Technicians

The Nova Scotia Library Association plans to launch the Library and Information Technology Mentoring Program in the fall of 2005. An information session will be held on March 1, 2005 for any Library Technicians in the workforce interested in the program.

The Library and Information Technology Mentoring Program involves pairing students with Library Technicians in the workforce. The goal of the program is to provide students with a chance to investigate different types of library environments.

Through the application process, students are paired with professionals who share similar library and leisure interests. Every effort is made to ensure students have a varied choice of libraries. The program follows the academic year, running from October to April. The pairing will last one academic year, with the option to renew.

The Nova Scotia Library Association will maintain a database of Library Technicians and students who have applied to participate in the program. Each year an NSLA sponsored workshop/sharing session will be held for mentors. The session will provide mentors with suggestions for activities

and topics to cover as well as an opportunity to share experiences.

The mentoring program will begin with a reception to allow students and mentors to meet in a friendly environment. The students and their mentors are then on their own to decide on activities and level of commitment. NSLA will sponsor events throughout the academic year in various regions, depending on the demand. At the end of the academic year, NSLA will host a social event to celebrate the end of the program.

The types of activities and topics of discussion can vary. Here are a few suggestions:

Tonics

- job applications
- interview tips
- career guidance
- issues related to library technicians
- participation in associations

Activities:

- tours of the workplace
- job shadowing
- attend workplace meetings

- attend library social events
- attend workshops
- introduce students to co-workers and arrange for students to spend time shadowing coworkers attend association function

Mentors must be currently working in the library field. Students must be enrolled in the Library and Information Technology Program.

When the program ends each year, both the student and the mentor will be asked to complete evaluation forms.

Program highlights announced for the 2005 APLA Conference




NEEDED: New Editors for the APLA Bulletin


