

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

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From St. Jer@me's Den

Here with a Loaf of Bread beneath the Bough, A Flask of Wine, a Book of Verse--- and Thou Beside me singing in the Wilderness---And Wilderness is Paradise enow. Rubaiyyat of Omar Khaiyyam translated by Edward Fitzgerald

I have always imagined that Paradise will be a kind of library. Jorge Luis Borges

Not all librarians would be happy to see bread and wine in the library, but most would agree with Khaiyyam and Borges that love, paradise, and libraries are complementary. If a library is a systematically arranged collection of materials, then one is limited by imagination only in envisioning what those materials would be and why not wine-related objects? It may not be as sensually romantic as finding paradise under a bough, but imagine working in a wine library. Job description: The successful candidate must have a love of wine and all things wine-related.

In 1961 in St. Helena (CA), a small group of dedicated people addressed the need to preserve priceless documents, books and papers concerning the history of local winemaking & viticulture. The result of their dedication was the Napa Valley Wine Library Association which was formed in 1963. It was to be maintained by, and for, "persons who are interested in books and other documents relating to wine, and the history of wine; to acquire funds for the Napa Valley Wine Library; to encourage and solicit gifts of books, manuscripts and other documents pertaining to wine, particularly those relating to Napa Valley viticulture, enology and wine lore." In addition to books and periodicals, the library, which is housed in the St. Helena Public Library, has a collection of 100,000 wine labels and more than 80 transcribed oral histories of those associated with the wine industry.

The Wine Library Associates of Sonoma County (CA) supports the Wine Library of Sonoma County. This library has the usual books, periodicals, films, and wine labels. In addition it has a clipping file of articles on wine, winemaking, grape growing, the wine business and the history of wine which is accessible on the web at http://www.winefiles.org/.

Now, as interesting as these libraries are, I think that my preferred destination library would be the Wine Library and Vinotheque at the University of British Columbia's Wine Research Centre (WRC). The BC Chapter of the Canadian Wine Library was established in 2002. Its library can house 22,000 bottles of wine and is operated under the auspices of a board of directors who are knowledgeable about wines. Wine makers nominate young wines produced in British Columbia and the wineries donate 24 bottles of each wine that have been selected for study in the WRC. These wines are aged in the Library and are tasted annually over a period of 24 years to establish a correlation between viticulture and enology practices in British Columbia and the ability of wines to age well. The WRC is establishing a Vinothegue for 8000 bottles of the world's finest wines. These wines will be used for sensory training of graduate students at the WRC.



The logo: The four background colours represent the four seasons: winter (blue), spring (green), summer (red) and autumn (orange). The ship recalls Québec as a port city and is a subtle hint at Champlain's arrival in 1608. The

open book represents knowledge and information. The sail is a Fleur-de-Lys, symbol of the House of France and the French fact in North America. The red of the IFLA name and background white are the colours of the Canadian flag.

PUBLIC LIBRARIES / BIBLIOTHÈQUES PUBLIQUES

Saint John Library Region

Libraries across the Saint John Library Region celebrated Canadian Library Month with a host of events:

Saint John Free Public Library

The three branches of the Saint John Free Public Library sponsored and organized a visit to the city by Roch Carrier. The Canadian author received extensive media coverage and attracted 220 participants to his three library events.

Bibliothèque le Cormoran

The library held a special book sale that saw some 320 book enthusiasts browse and buy some of their reading material for the winter months ahead.

Kennebecasis Public Library

The Kennebecasis Public Library invited the Saint John String Quartet; these performers mesmerized the audience at a "cushion concert for kids."

Sussex Regional Library

Fifty-nine participants attended a program with author/nature photographer Vicki Cameron.

Other libraries in the Region featured a special promotion and discussion to mark the month at the launch of each of the season's fall programs.

Haut-Saint-Jean Region

Canadian Library Month in Haut-Saint-Jean was filled with numerous activities. Contests, story times, and all manners of programs were held.

This past summer, the Université de Moncton Campus d'Edmundston (UMCE) once again generously donated a bursary worth \$500 to one young person in the Haut-Saint-Jean Library Region. The

bursary would be used by future UMCE students. Grade 7-8 students who completed their Summer Reading Club contracts were eligible for the drawing. The bursary recipient was 13-year-old Michèle Hébert of Edmundston. On hand at the Mgr. W.J. Conway Public Library to present Michèle with her bursary was UMCE representative Francine LeBel.

Edmundston

Governor-General Award nominated French Children's author Édith Bourget was on hand in Edmundston. She spoke to school aged children about her books. Ms. Bourget is also an artist.

Mgr Plourde Public Library

In early September, Édith Bourget gave a presentation in St-François at the Mgr Plourde Public Library.

The front lobby, reading room and microfilm storage room, totaling 1,177 square feet, have been given a major facelift and barrier-free accessibility has been enhanced. The renovations were designed to provide space and privacy for consulting records and research, improve wheelchair accessibility on the main floor, bring more natural light and ventilation to the lobby and reception area, and offer a proper meeting room for the benefit of the Archives and other organizations such as historical and genealogical societies.

During the renovations, important elements of the building's original architecture were preserved such as a mosaic in the terrazzo floor, and unique birds-eye maple woodwork and wrought iron 'fiddlehead' railings. "These improvements are great news for the many visitors who come to the Provincial Archives," said Supply and Services Minister Roly MacIntyre. "Improved access, more privacy, better security for documents and brighter surroundings will help the Archives meet the increasing demand for its services." In-person visits to the Provincial Archives now total about 10,000 per year. "We've had lots of positive feedback about the renovations," said Marion Beyea, provincial archivist. "Visitors have found the improvements to be more comfortable with quieter and more controlled air circulation, better lighting and a separate area for microfilm research."

Multicon Property Services Ltd. of Fredericton was awarded the \$400,000 contract in June 2006 and completed the renovation work in November 2006.

The Archives are used for many types of research by academics, local historians, architects, the legal profession and writers. A large number of other inquiries involve genealogical research for vital statistics (births, marriages, deaths) as well as cemetery listings. These searches are often followed by requests for official documents from the Archives. Thousands of other public inquiries are made to the Archives each year through letters, e-mails, faxes and telephone calls. The Archives website also receives about 1.5 million hits per month.

Newspaper clippings on microfilm, priceless maps, architectural drawings, video tapes, audio recordings, bound volumes, manuscript collections, government records, census records, letters and diaries, photographs and films, souvenir pictures from royal visits, or snapshots of New Brunswick life "in days gone by" are also found at the Archives. Until 1967, the original Provincial Archives building housed the University of New Brunswick library. The structure was built in the late 1920s and an expansion was added in 1951. A major controlled environment storage facility was added in 2003, allowing the current modifications.

NEW BRUNSWICK MUSEUM / MUSÉE DU NOUVEAU-BRUNSWICK

The Archives and Research Library of the New Brunswick Museum recently participated in a project examining iron gall ink in the archival collections. Season Tse and Sherry Guild from the Canadian Conservation Institute, and Harold Holland of the Provincial Archives of New Brunswick, arrived at the Museum for the week of October 30, 2006. They worked together with Museum conservation staff.

The Canadian Conservation Institute has partnered with Library and Archives Canada on a project that is focused on assessing the extent of iron gall ink in Canadian collections and determining whether or not material with iron gall ink is at risk of deterioration. Results from the survey will help identify the extent and condition of iron gall

ink in the paper-based collection and establish a benchmark for monitoring the condition of Archives and Research Library holdings in the future. A previous assessment undertaken in 2004 determined that a large proportion of our pre-1900 records contain iron gall ink. Iron gall ink was in use from the middle ages to the end of the 19th century, and was prized for its rich black colour and its ease of manufacture. It was made from tannin extracted from tree galls (the substance the trees produce when insects lay eggs in them), vitriol (a naturally occurring salt), gum (usually from the Acacia tree) and water. Various other additives such as wine, vinegar, or even hydrochloric acid were sometimes used. Because of the acids in iron gall ink, it corrodes the paper over time and can result in complete loss of writings and drawings.

Annapolis Valley Regional Library

Automated Library System

All branch locations of the Annapolis Valley Regional Library have wireless access to the Internet. This is quite popular with residents and tourists, providing them with access to a high speed Internet connection on their own equipment. This service is available even when the branch is closed, extending the hours of use.

Our region is participating in a pilot project with the Provincial Library and a couple of other regions to test the process of authenticating these users with our library database. This would be done when they signed on to the service. This would allow us to keep statistics on the number of people using this service.

Community Access Program (CAP)

There has been a lot of publicity around the

Community Access Program (CAP), this fall. The program was slated by Industry Canada to "sunset" at the end of September. Through public lobbying the program has been extended to the end of March, 2007 with some additional transition funding. This funding should allow the doors of the stand alone community sites to stay open until the end of March when it is hoped a long term funding solution will be found.

Public access will continue at public libraries throughout the province even without CAP, but it is the level of service available that is in jeopardy. Without CAP funding, equipment is not refreshed as often as needed and additional instruction or assistance is not available to users.

It looks hopeful that a fall/winter youth program will be available. This is a very valuable program. This program will provide part-time youth at requested sites for approximately eight weeks before the end of February. We are waiting for the

final word on this proposed program.

As President of the Nova Scotia Library Association, Charlotte Janes has been invited along with Eric Stackhouse, Chair of the Nova Scotia CAP Association to meet with the Legislative Committee's Standing Committee on Economic Development to discuss CAP. They will make a presentation, then move into a question and answer session. This meeting is to take place on November 14, 2006. The provincial Office of Economic Development is a long standing partner for CAP in Nova Scotia.

CBC - Words at Large

We were contacted by CBC and asked if we would participate in their Words at Large feature of the ten requested fiction titles as a public library. For the months of September and October a different city from across Canada was featured each week. Our region was featured the week of October 10th.

Branch Services Report - October 2006

We've hosted some very interesting and popular programs so far this fall!

On October 4th, we were very pleased to offer a lecture entitled "Canada in Afghanistan: What's Our Role?" by journalist, war correspondent and author Scott Taylor at the Wolfville Memorial Library. As a first-hand witness to many of the world's recent clashes, Scott Taylor brought to the audience a rare insight of the understanding of these complicated war zones.

Energy consultant, Art Irwin, travelled to the Wolfville Memorial Library for a presentation on "Getting Your Home Ready forWinter". Most of the audience was familiar with Mr. Irwin's broad knowledge on the topic via the CBC Maritime Noon call-in show on which he is a frequent guest. Participants brought their questions and some took lots of notes!

Teen Read Week was held in late October and a variety of awesome events were available for this age group. Bellydance Workshops were held in Windsor and Wolfville; a mehndi tattoo program in Bridgetown; a Dance Dance Revolution event in Middleton; a Hip Hop dance workshop in Kentville; a Midnight Madness evening in Wolfville; and an Anime Night in Berwick. Participants at all events were enthusiastic about these cool programs!

Three special Baby Jamborees were held this month at Kentville, Wolfville and Windsor as part of the regular Babies & Books program. Books, rhymes, songs, snacks, giveaways, and door prizes were all part of this unique time for babies & their caregivers.

In Annapolis County, we have partnered with the Family Resource Centre Family Matters to offer a pre-school program at our Annapolis Royal and Bridgetown libraries, with a commitment to all 4 of our Annapolis County branches in the spring. Currently , Canadian Federation of University Women funding is sponsoring preschool programs in Lawrencetown and Middleton.

All libraries are suffering from the loss of funding of the federal C@P program. The disappearance of the free one-on-one computer tutorials formerly available to our patrons has placed a burden on staff to offer more assistance to people for whom computers and the associated technology is a new challenge.

Our library is now actively promoting and welcoming the sponsorship of any library programs by community groups, organizations or individuals, and we are happy to meet to discuss such specific donations.

Eastern Counties Regional Library

Eastern Counties Regional Library recently launched the opening of its newest Libr@ry Link site in Cheticamp. The bilingual Link site, located in the NDA school library, will be open on Wednesdays every 4 weeks from 3:00 5:30 and 6:00 7:30 pm. With the addition of Cheticamp, ECRL now has 9 Libr@ry Link sites, 2 of them bilingual. Link sites were established in 2000 after maintenance and repair costs forced the retirement of the bookmobile service. An assortment of French and English materials for adults and children, including books, audio books, large print materials, magazines, CDs, and DVDs are brought to the sites and are available for loan, while small permanen, collections are housed at the sites where possible. The Library has 7 Branches and offers additional services including Books by Mail. a householder delivery service, and online access to the library catalogue.

Author/painter Geoff Butler was in the region recently for an author tour. Thanks to funding from the Canada Council for the Arts, readings were held in the Canso Library and in St. Peter's at the Bras D'Or Lakes Inn. This year, by forming additional partnership opportunities in the communities, the library and its sponsors, were able to make the tour "value added". The reading in St. Peter's was located at the Bras D'Or Lakes

Inn, compliments of the owners/operators, and an additional presentation was held in Port Hawkesbury, sponsored by the Town of Port Hawkesbury Civic Centre, a new state of the art facility. At the Port Hawkesbury event, Geoff also displayed several pieces of art that he had brought with him. Maritime Inn Port Hawkesbury provided Geoff's accommodations. Geoff also travelled to elementary schools in Mulgrave and St. Peter's to read from his children's books and to display some of his works in progress.

Halifax Public Libraries Introduces Imagination Stations


Preschool children in Halifax will soon have more than books to keep them busy at their local library. All 14 branches of Halifax Public Libraries are introducing Imagination Stations specially designed to help preschoolers learn though play by engaging them in games that develop their thinking, reasoning, literacy and motor skills.

The Stations, which feature bead and lacing toys, colourful magnetic toys, puzzles, blocks, pegboards and more, are custom-built to suit the branch and community where they are located. The first three Imagination Stations are currently open at the Halifax North, Keshen Goodman and Tantallon branches. The rest will be built and installed over the coming months.

"We want to encourage families to spend time together in the library," says Tracey Jones, Literacy, ESL and Diversity Services Manager. "Play is an important part of the learning process especially for toddlers. These Stations really complement traditional notions of literacy."

Bedford Branch Builds DVD Collections with

A \$3,000 community development grant allowed the Bedford Public Library to create a Healthy Child Development Collection featuring 45 DVDs and a Fitness Collection made up of 60 DVDs.

The DVDs cover a wide range of topics such as fertility, pregnancy, child safety, nutrition, yoga, strength training, cardio workouts, dance fitness and Tai Chi. They are intended to complement the Library's existing collection of quality print materials.

PARL Launches Reading Challenge

With the successful children's reading initiative, the Adopt A Library Literacy Program, continually reaching for new heights, program founder, Constable John Kennedy was seconded to the

offices of the Pictou - Antigonish Regional Library this September. During his two year tenure, which is the first of its kind in Canada, Kennedy will be on hand to offer direct support and promotion to the development of the Adopt A Library Literacy Program. Parents can assist in the success of the program by explaining to their children the importance of practicing good reading habits such as reading aloud, talking about what they are reading, and taking them to their free, public library. Most educators will agree, developing good reading habits at an early age helps children develop self-esteem and enables them to make good choices over their life time.

Travelling Photographic Exhibit Captures Piece of Fishing History

Many family albums contain them. They are the black and white images of generations past that place the chapter being written today within a context of shared history. An exhibit traveling through all 10 branches of the Western Counties Regional Library offers that glimpse into southwestern Nova Scotia's family album. Fishing Fundy Waters is an exhibit of photographs by celebrated American documentary photographer John Collier Jr. (1913-1992). The photographs throw the spotlight on life along Nova Scotia's southwestern tip in the immediate post-Second World War period by focusing on its source of sustenance, the fishery. Collier photographed lobster fishermen and clam diggers. His images captured hand lining and scallop dragging. Through his lens, the viewer can gain a better understanding of the roots from which today's diverse and flourishing fisheries grew.

The photographs in this exhibit were taken by Collier between 1950 and 1951 when he was working with Dr. Alexander Leighton of Smith's Cove. Based on his long-standing interest in the use of photography to record history, Leighton was able to procure a grant so that Collier could produce photographs showing the day-to-day life of residents of this area of Nova Scotia. They are a stunning visual record, says Western Counties Regional Library director Trudy Amirault. "The importance of such a photographic document of our area cannot be overestimated," she says. "The photographs of John Collier Jr. let us reflect upon the past to give us a better understanding of where we have come from." Amirault is a member of the Wilson Collier Committee that has been working to realize the goal of sharing this visual legacy for more than five years. The committee acknowledges with thanks the cooperation and support of the families of the individuals depicted in the photographs, without whom this exhibit would not have been possible.

The exhibit is travelling to all 10 branches of Western Counties Regional Library. It opened at the Isaiah W. Wilson Memorial Library in Digby in August 2006 and will tour the region until June 2007, when it will be on display during the summer of 2007 at the Nova Scotia Archives and Records Management in Halifax. It will then return to the Digby library, its permanent home.

Mount St. Vincent University Library

Mount Saint Vincent University Library is accepting graduate theses on CD for permanent preservation. Participating is easy and the new procedure will save graduating students the expense of thesis binding. Eventually all MSVU theses will be submitted and stored as PDF files on the new institutional repository, which is in the planning stages, and being funded in part by the national Synergies project and CFI funding. 

Student Affairs is now providing a range of learning support services in the MSVU Library. Writing support is available on Wednesday evenings between 5:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. Assistance with study and organizational skills, time management, or other things related to learning is available on a daily basis. Individual and group support is available.

MSVU Library is one of five libraries in North America to receive a \$3000 US grant to cover the registration cost for the highly regarded library service assessment tool LibQUAL+. Students, faculty and staff will be asked to complete a webbased survey which probes for opinions about Library resources, services and about the Library as a space for independent learning. The survey will be conducted during the winter term of 2007.

In September MSVU Library welcomed Shelagh Legere as the new Circulation Coordinator. Shelagh worked as a circulation assistant in Reserves previously and is a graduate of MSVU and NSCC. Edythe Davidson also joined the staff as the new circulation assistant for Reserves.

During the winter term, MSVU is taking small steps to investigate the potential of Second Life as a learning platform, by creating a pilot program as part of Employee Relations PBRL 4101, a Public Relations course taught by Dr. DeNel Rehberg Sedo. The module will be created and delivered by Dr. Rehberg Sedo, with pedagogical and techni-



cal assistance from Extended Services Librarian Denyse Rodrigues and additional research support from University Librarian Donna Bourne-Tyson.

Nova Scotia Community College Library Services

The Library Service has developed a dynamic strategy designed to equip students with a set of information literacy skills. Today's students must become highly skilled in accessing and evaluating information in order to become effective problem solvers, decision makers and lifelong learners. This three year initiative will focus on developing information literacy modules for use in classroom instruction, fostering faculty-librarian collaboration on curriculum content as it relates to skills acquired through information literacy and supporting librarians as teachers of information literacy principles.

This fall several Campus libraries hosted coffee breaks in support of the Alzheimer Society of Nova Scotia coffee time fundraiser where over \$500 was

raised. A very successful exhibit on Mi'kmaq heritage was created by Wendy McInnis, Library Assistant at the Pictou Campus Library. Members from the Pictou Landing First Nations School provided antique baskets, quill boxes, birch bark flowers and many artifacts for exhibit in the library. This exhibit was used as a vehicle for presentations to several ALP Canadian History classes.

The Truro Campus library has been host to several arts related events. In August student works from both NSCC and the New Brunswick Community College were featured in the Animedia Expedition,



where a number of NSCC learners took home awards. The Halifax Painter's Palette displayed works by local and regional artists and in October the County of Colchester Acquisition Show displayed works by local artists reflecting on the history of the County. These events have served to bring College and community members together in an environment of learning and celebration.

The metro region library staff toured the new waterfront campus and are impressed not only with the magnificent view but with the amazing central location on campus. Collection development is underway and all librarians are contributing to selection of materials to support programs located at the new campus. Several new programs at the campus include Deaf Studies, Music Business & Arts, Rehabilitation Services and Environment Technician – Restoration.


The Slow Library Movement - Lecture by SIM Outstanding Alumnus

CISTI

Canada Institute for Scientific and Technical Information (CISTI) has an improved presence on Prince Edward Island. The National Research Council (NRC) Information Centre in Charlottetown has relocated to the first floor of the Institute for Nutrisciences and Health (INH), the new NRC building on UPEI campus.



The NRC Information Centre has a small print collection supporting the research at INH, as well as access to over 40,000 electronic resources available to the researchers through their desktop. The public can access many resources as well through three public access workstations.

The public is encouraged in drop in and learn

about what CISTI has to offer as well as learn about the research that is taking place at INH.

Scientists at the Institute for Nutrisciences and Health are involved in identifying how bioactive compounds found in nature can be used to improve human and animal health. Research focuses on the role natural compounds play in three key areas: neurological disorders (such as Alzheimer's disease); obesity-related disorders (such as Diabetes); and infection and immunity (such as viral infections).
