

Welcome


We held our first Executive Meeting on Tuesday October 20th. Traditionally, this is our first inperson meeting, but this year we moved to a virtual setting. It is wonderful when the Executive get together and share our thoughts whether it is in-person or virtually. These are tough times for library and information workers, their families, and library associations. It is delightful to share and hear about the dedication, and enthusiasm from our members, volunteers, supporters, and allies who continue to work in the best interests of libraries and information workers and the communities they serve. Thank you to all our members for your continued support and work.

The Partnership

VP President-Elect Marc Harper and I attended the *Fall Retreat(s)* of *The Partnership*, a national network of provincial and territorial library associations. This year the Summer meeting was held in the Fall and moved to two shorter virtual sessions. These roundtables allowed member associations to share our collective challenges and exchange ideas. Maintaining membership is of course important and continues to be discussed at all meetings. However, there are additional challenges during covid-19 such as delays and cancellations in conferences whilst associations "go virtual", and challenges moving to virtual OGMs, sometimes where the bylaws only allow for in-person voting. Associations are stepping up and seeking ways to support their members through these challenging times.

APLA Governance Working Group

At the Summer APLA Executive meeting, the Executive decided to form a working group to look at our governance structure. The governance structure ultimately serves the members. We last looked comprehensively at programs and structure in 2012 and were led by then President-Elect





Lou Duggan. The terms of reference for the working group are provided by me and are to examine the governance structure of the Atlantic Provinces Library Association to see if the current structure serves the needs of the Atlantic Provinces Library Association. The working group will produce recommendations as to whether the governance structure should be modified, and if so, how it should be modified. Ideally, any potential changes will be brought to the 2021 OGM; however, given the challenges faced by all members and associations during covid-19 this may be a later OGM.

The governance working group is ably led by President-Elect Marc Harper and members are Erin Alcock (VP Membership), Cate Carlyle (VP Nova Scotia & Convenor of the Continuing Education Interest Group), Sarah Gladwell (APLA President 2010-2011 and current APLA Chair Memorial Awards Committee), and Cynthia Holt (APLA Secretary 2018-2019, Executive Director, CAULCBUA). We are grateful to these APLA members for agreeing to undertake this important work on our behalf and look forward to the results of their work.


Dalhousie SIM Association Day







APLA Nominations and Elections 2021


The APLA Nominations and Elections Committee is now accepting nominations (including self-nominations) for the following executive positions:

APLA 2021 Virtual Conference






Strategic Planning and Project Cycle

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




- Natalia Barykina, Graduate Studies Librarian, will be starting with Memorial University Libraries on April 1, 2021.


Newfoundland and Labrador Public Libraries Launches NL Reads 2021


one will be declared NL's "must-read" book of the year.



Marjorie Mews Public Library Outdoor Storytime




Congratulations to the Marjorie Mews staff for delivering an excellent program and their willingness to try a new Storytime set-up!

Michael Donovan Emily Hepditch Author Reading



Open Access Week 2020



Crafts to Go


The PEI Public Library Service was able to procure a grant through Reading Street from PEI Writer's Guild and TD. The grant was used to create 2 Craft to Go bags for preschoolers (250 of each!), one was 'Rhythm Shakers' and the second was 'Fun with Numbers.'





On top of that, we launched our first 'Craft to Go' for teens, a 'Kawaii Sun Catcher' and one for adults, a 'Macramé Key chain'. These have proven to be very popular and we plan to continue with kits for different age groups into the New Year.

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Storywalk

The PEI Public Library Service was also granted funding through Reading Street, from PEI Writers Guild and TD to create 2 Storywalks (one in English, one in French). These were set up in multiple locations across the island throughout the fall and have also been quite popular!



Fall Photo Scavenger Hunt

We facilitated a Fall Photo Scavenger Hunt across the Island, using the

free app: Goosechase. Many families joined in the fun and over 200 photos were submitted!


were put on by Community Legal Information: Health Care Decisions and Wills and Estates.
