




#### Committees, Interest Groups, and Working Group


#### **Keynote Speaker: Gerald Gloade (Millbrook First Nation)**

## Carin Alma E. Somers Scholarship


The Carin Alma E. Somers Scholarship Trust

Carin Alma E. Somers Scholarship Form / La Bourse Carin Alma E. Somers

The Atlantic Provinces Library Association administers the Carin Somers Scholarship Trust. The trust provides an annual scholarship, valued at approximately \$1,000, in her name to assist a Canadian citizen who is an Atlantic Provinces resident needing financial assistance to undertake or complete the academic requirements leading to a degree in Library and Information Studies. Selection of the recipient will be recommended by a committee of the four Provincial Vice Presidents and the President-Elect to the Executive Committee. The successful applicant will have been accepted to a School of Graduate Studies as a candidate for a Master's degree in Library and Information Studies accredited by the American Library Association. The award will normally be announced at the Annual Atlantic Provinces Library Association Spring Conference.

#### Carin Alma E. Somers 1934-1990

Carin Alma E. Somers was the Provincial Librarian for Nova Scotia from 1974 to 1987. Her working career as a librarian started in 1958 when she went to work at what was then the Halifax Memorial Library. She worked there both before and after going to library school at the University of Toronto. Carin became Chief Librarian of the Halifax County Regional Library in 1967 and oversaw the rapid growth of that region. In 1973, she was appointed Supervisor of Public Libraries (NS Provincial Library) and in 1974, Provincial Librarian. Carin was always a tireless supporter of public service, libraries and both CLA and APLA. During her time as Provincial Librarian, 100% of the population of Nova Scotia became served by public libraries. She was president of APLA, a second vice president of CLA, a guest lecturer at the Dalhousie School of Library and Information Services, and a frequent speaker at trustees meetings. In 1988, APLA honoured Carin with its Merit Award. Carin died in 1990. The terms the trust established by her family are a demonstration of her interest in people and the profession she chose (preceding from the APLA Bulletin, *May/June 1990* and *Sept./Oct. 1996*).




APLA Merit Award Nominations for the 2021 APLA Merit Award are now being accepted.

### **Games at the Library 2020 Report**

The 2020 Games at the Library week was held from Sunday, October 16 through Saturday, October 24, inclusively. These dates were chosen so APLA's Games at the Library could align with celebrating Canadian Library Month. It was important this year, more than ever, to provide opportunities for community members to practice self-care through fun experiences and to connect with their community in safe ways.

All participants during Games at the Library week were eligible to enter their names in the grand prize draw, which took place November 16, 2020. This year there were 414 ballots submitted for the grand prize draw, and 281 participants. A total of fifteen libraries sent in ballots and tally sheets in 2020. This rate of participation has decreased from the 2019 Games at the Library, when 45 libraries submitted ballots and tally sheets. Rates of library participation were lowered significantly due to Covid-19.


Putting on a socially distanced, safe, and game-themed event was a challenge, and many libraries may not have the resources to be able to put on an event while also following safety procedures. Many libraries may have had reduced hours, have been short staffed, or may have not been able to welcome patrons in for programs or events. Most academic libraries were closed to patrons in the fall.

Library staff were very creative and put in extra time to organize, given the added challenge of making the event fun, safe, and socially distanced. Libraries offered many types of games including board, card, video, and building games (both socially distanced and lent for the week to family bubbles). Active and outdoor games were also offered. Virtual games included a virtual family bingo and an online escape room. Other games included: puzzles, trivia, Scrabble (patrons vs. librarians), Duplicate Scrabble, a pet photo contest, and guessing games.

Games included practicing literacy, creativity, memory, strategic thinking, problem solving, spatial analysis, nonverbal reasoning, and motor skills. Libraries held socially distanced games to encourage social connection while following state of emergency restrictions.

Denise Green Jesso participated in the 2020 Games at the Library week at A.C. Hunter Public Library in St. John's, Newfoundland and won the grand prize of an online \$175 gift card for EB Games!

Many thanks to Margaret Vail (APLA Webmaster) and Kim Mears (APLA Communications Coordinator) for disseminating the information about Games at the Library online via the APLA Games at the Library website and APLA social media accounts. Thanks also to Terri Winchcombe (APLA Treasurer) for purchasing and sending the prize, and APLA President Ann Smith for her guidance and support. Finally, a big thank you to everyone who held a Games at the Library event this year! The goal of Games at the Library is to show that libraries are places where people meet, learn, and have fun. That goal was met, and libraries were celebrated through the wide range of successful activities offered by Atlantic libraries during the Games at the Library 2020.



#### **Employee News**


**New Hires:**

**Louise McGillis** will be finishing her term as Associate Dean of Libraries at the end of November 2021 and will then begin an administrative leave.





#### Newfoundland & Labrador Public Libraries Launches Inaugural Black History Month Program

Newfoundland and Labrador Public Libraries (NLPL) are happy to announce the launch of their first ever Black History Month program. This will be a province-wide celebration of the Black community living within Newfoundland & Labrador, with free events and programming to be held online.

This program was possible through the TD Ready Commitment grant from TD Bank. "This February is not just another African Heritage Month. We are coming together at a time in which Black communities and allies around the globe are questioning whether the protests of last summer inspired moments or movements," says Jennifer Auld, VP Atlantic Region at TD Bank Group. "We are proud to support Newfoundland and Labrador Public Libraries, as we push progress forward for the Black colleagues, customers, and communities we serve."


This grant has been used to support the programming that NLPL will be putting on over the course of February. On February 1<sup>st</sup>, in partnership with Memorial University's



Grenfell Campus, Black History Month kicked off with a talk from Dr. Afua Cooper, a Dalhousie Professor whose studies deal with the history of Black people in Canada. Various programs and events will be held across the province, both online and in-person, along with videos on the NLPL's social media and YouTube channel.

The funds from the TD Bank grant have also been put toward collection development. New releases by Black authors have been added to the NLPL's digital library, and book club kits have been created in St. John's. Patrons will be able to participate in province-wide discussions through NLPL's two book club titles, *I've Been Meaning to Tell You* by David Chariandy and *Me and White Supremacy* by Layla F. Saad. Both titles will be available with unlimited eBook access for all of February.



#### Dal Reads 2020/21: The Marrow Thieves





This year's <u>Dal Reads</u> book is *The Marrow Thieves* by Cherie Dimaline. *The Marrow Thieves* is a dystopic novel set in the not-too-distant future. Humanity has nearly destroyed the world as the effects of global warming have taken hold. In this dark setting, the Indigenous people of North America are being hunted and harvested for their bone marrow. The settler population believes the marrow of Indigenous people carries the key to recovering something they have lost: the ability to dream. A young adult named Frenchie and his companions struggle to survive against this backdrop as they make their way north.

For the first time in the history of Dal Reads, we did not purchase any physical copies of the book due to the majority of classes being online. Instead, we negotiated a license for unlimited, simultaneous access of the eBook for the Dalhousie community for the duration of the academic year.

We presented three events on this year's selection in January, which included a live discussion between Indigenous Services Librarian Samantha Adema and *The Marrow Thieves* author Cherie Dimaline.




#### **Open Educational Resource (OER) Grant**

#### <u>Atlantic Canada Book Launch for N'in D'La Owey Innklan: Mi'kmaq Sojourns in England by</u> Bonita Lawrence

Dr. Bonita Lawrence is a professor in the Department of Humanities at York University and is a founding member of the Indigenous Studies program. She is of Mi'kmaq, Acadian, and English ancestry. At this Atlantic Canada launch of her new historical novel, she was joined by Dr. Marie Battiste, Sings to the Forest, Dr. Sean Hillier, Cathy Martin, and Dr. Margaret Robinson.

N'in D'la Owey Innklan: Mi'kmaq Sojourns in England begins in 1497 and takes the reader on a series of vignettes through five centuries of interconnections between Mi'kmaq people and London. In addition to this novel, Dr. Lawrence




has authored two academic books, Fractured Homeland: Federal Recognition and Algonquin Identity in Ontario and "Real" Indians and Others: Mixed-Race Urban Native People and Indigenous Nationhood. With Kim Anderson, she co-authored a collection of essays entitled Strong Women Stories: Native Vision and Community Survival.


#### **Staff News**






#### **Virtual Programs**

#### **Snowshoe Lending**


Our popular snowshoe lending program is back for another winter!

#### **Flipster**





#### **In Memoriam**

University of Prince Edward Island's first president, Dr. Ronald Baker, passed away peacefully on December 12, 2020. University Archivist, Simon Lloyd, shared his memories:

"I had the pleasure to meet with Dr. Baker many times over the last decade, and I quickly understood why he had been an amazing president during UPEI's foundational years, and why his leadership was widely credited with helping the University overcome numerous challenges during its first decade... Dr. Baker received many honours, including Officer of the Order of Canada (1978), the Queen's Silver and Golden Jubilee Medals (1977, 2002), and honorary doctorates from the University of New Brunswick, Mount Allison University, Simon Fraser University, and UPEI. On behalf of the entire UPEI community, I offer my most sincere condolences to Dr. Baker's family, friends, and former colleagues and students."

Prior to his passing, we were able to interview Dr. Baker as part of the 50 Years, 50 Voices project and that interview has been added to the <u>site</u>.

#### **Digital Collections**


As part of our ongoing digital collection migration project, we have relaunched two collections recently including the <u>Prince of Wales College Digital Archive</u> and the <u>Island Narratives Digital Collection</u>. We are hoping to relaunch other collections before the end of the winter semester.

#### **Collaboration with 4th Year Computer Science students**

Librarian Rosie Le Faive and developer Alexander O'Neill are working with Dr. David LeBlanc's 4th-year computer science capstone students to bridge Islandora / <u>IslandNewspapers</u> with the Library of Congress's <u>Newspaper Navigator</u> machine learning-based entity extraction system. This will facilitate a search of images that appear in the newspapers.

#### **Black History Month/Year**

Dr. Yolanda Hood is coordinating a year-long Community Reads collaboration to read Desmond Cole's book *The Skin We're In: A Year of Black Resistance and Power*. Leila Edwards from the Citizens for Public Justice says "*The Skin We're In* actively contests Canada's national narrative by following a year in Black encounters with and resistance to white supremacy.... This book forces readers to confront Canada's historical and contemporary narratives and reflect on what exactly is being celebrated." Each month participants will read a chapter from Cole's book each month and discuss the chapter using an intersectional and antiracist lens.





#### **Open Textbook Champions Program**

As part of the Library's Open Education Resource Development Program, librarian Kim Mears has developed a <u>Textbook Champions Program</u> and will be launching that during Open Education Week, March 1-5th. The program profiles UPEI faculty that have created, adapted, or adopted Open Education Resources for use their courses.
