


J.A. Wainwright Virtual Book Launch: This Cleaving and this Burning

Dalhousie Libraries' Document Delivery department is thrilled to let our users know that we are once again filling requests with physical copies of materials wherever possible. Since March 17, we had been limited to sharing digital materials only, as libraries across Canada and the around world closed their doors.

While we are pleased to be able to offer this service once again, we know that many libraries are still not able to loan items from their print collections. Many of those that are loaning materials are operating with reduced staffing levels, so it will be more challenging to locate certain materials and it may take longer to get requested items. Alternate Sexton Library Space

On the recommendation of Dalhousie's Health & Safety Office related to concerns about insufficient ventilation, the Sexton Library will not be opening for student and faculty use this fall. Instead, the Dalhousie Libraries will be offering alternative study space on the Sexton campus in the classroom across the hall from the Sexton Library.

The staff of the Sexton Library did an incredible job and pulled together this alternative library space, on extremely short notice, keeping the need for social distancing in mind, in a week. The space offers 10 socially distanced study tables for three-hour bookable time slots and a printer workstation.
