

As the warm weather abandons us until 2022, the APLA Executive Committee met virtually on Tuesday, October 26th, 2021. Many thanks to our new Secretary, **Victoria Volkanova**, for embracing her new role by helping with agenda preparation and her timely follow-up with the meeting minutes.


Despite the regular technological glitches that we now consider an indispensable part of virtual communication, the meeting was a productive one.

The main output was a review of APLA's anti-racism statement. The statement was originally crafted by former APLA President **Louise White** in her function as APLA's Advocacy Committee Chair. As this position changed in June, our new Chair, **Nicole Rosenow-Redhead**, expanded on the statement and complemented the initiative by providing APLA with well-researched resources that are now at the disposal of all our members. APLA's anti-racism statement has been released to our membership and we are accepting feedback until the end of the month before it is made official.

The Executive Committee meeting also reviewed APLA's proposed Media Relations Policy which was prepared by **Cynthia Holt** of the Council of Atlantic University Libraries.

National Day for Truth & Reconciliation

September 30th, 2021 marked Canada's first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. To mark the occasion, we invited APLA members to submit content about library or community-based Truth and Reconciliation initiatives, from a coordinator or participant perspective. Submissions will be shared in this edition of the Bulletin. Although readers can submit Truth and Reconciliation content any time of year, we hope the Fall Issue of the Bulletin will become an annual chronicle of different initiatives and activities that have taken place in the Atlantic Provinces.

Dalhousie SIM Association Day



- •Receive a certificate of completion and a full record of your learning activities.







Feature Articles - Truth and Reconciliation Initiatives

Reconciliation Initiative at the Annapolis Royal Library

The Beyond Oqwa'titek Reconciliation Pledge and Signature Register were created by **Bill MacDonald**, who is a former mayor of the Town of Annapolis Royal.


Mr. MacDonald has had extensive experience leading initiatives which promote diversity and inclusiveness. During his time as mayor, Mr. MacDonald worked in partnership with Bear River First Nation to develop the Oqwa'titek Amphitheatre, marking it as a place of Mi'kmaw history and heritage, and from which the Beyond Oqwa'titek reconciliation initiative was inspired. As part of the Town of Annapolis Royal's reconciliation initiative, the Beyond Oqwa'titek Reconciliation Pledge and Signature Register was created as an opportunity for people in the community to begin their own journey of reconciliation by pledging to increase their cultural awareness, and Mr. MacDonald personally asked the Annapolis Royal Library if they would host the Reconciliation Pledge and Signature Register.

In his own words about this initiative, Mr. MacDonald stated:

People often ask what they can do as individuals to support reconciliation. As a personal act of reconciliation, you can pledge to become a change maker by increasing your cultural awareness and understanding - to become a better ally and deepen your relationships with indigenous people.



The Beyond Oqwa'titek Reconciliation Pledge and Signature Register are now available for signing at the Annapolis Royal Library. A postcard 5x7 copy of the Reconciliation Pledge is provided to every person who signs the pledge.





Moving Through at Annapolis Valley Regional Library

Our library, Annapolis Valley Regional Library, has been working on a project called Moving Through. We have hosted staff knowledge sharing events, as well as a Gathering on September 4.

Using the principles of the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action, and the guiding themes of the Nova Scotia Culture Action Plan, Moving Through incorporates Indigenous ways of knowing and doing to the development of programs, library spaces, and materials. This helps build relationships between Annapolis Valley Regional Library (AVRL) and three area First Nations communities of Annapolis Valley, Bear River, and Glooscap, and strengthens literacy connections for local Indigenous families. Mi'kmaq Artists and the Corner Brook Public Library Connect Through Art

The Corner Brook Public Library, residing on Elmastukwek – Bay of Islands, is honoured to add works of Indigenous art to the library's space. Mi'kmaq Artists Marcus Gosse, Jenny Brake, and Jordan Bennett, all hailing from the west coast of Newfoundland, have generously loaned their works of art to the library.


As the public enters the library's space, they are greeted by three large canvas paintings by Marcus Gosse. Each painting incorporates ancient Mi'kmaq stars, petroglyphs, hieroglyphs, and double curve designs into the landscapes, and each one portrays the culture and history of the Mi'kmaq people. Soon to be featured alongside Gosse's art will be prints by Jenny Brake and Jordan Bennett, shown below. Each print provides an opportunity for reflection on the histories of the Mi'kmaq Nation and other Indigenous communities.

The addition of Indigenous art, along with Newfoundland and Labrador Public Libraries <u>Indigenous</u> <u>Collection</u>, shows NLPL's commitment to "strive to reflect diverse Indigenous values, ways of learning and worldviews." It also serves as Corner Brook Public Library's commitment to continually connect with and support the Mi'kmaq community. The hope is to also expand on this initiative by supporting all local artists through the inclusion of additional works of art throughout the library's space.



Four Seasons of Reconciliation Course at Dalhousie

As part of Dalhousie's ongoing commitment to reconciliation, this online course is available to all Dalhousie faculty, staff, and administration through the Dalhousie Libraries. Four Seasons of Reconciliation provides comprehensive and decolonialized education in a multi-media format in line with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's *94 Calls to Action*.

The course was developed by Reconciliation Education, an e-learning producer of online resources, and the First Nations University of Canada for workplaces and the education sector. An Indigenous Advisory Circle, comprised of Elders, Knowledge Keepers, educators, and members of the First Nations University of Canada, was consulted on the creation of the course.

This year, the course is funded by Dalhousie's Faculty of Engineering; responsibility for funding the course will be shared across different faculties and units in future years.






Indigenization – Memorial University Libraries are engaged in a variety of projects and activities related to the University's Indigenous mandate. Current projects include:

Decolonizing our online resources — Memorial University Libraries is working at the local and national level to update the subject headings in our online resources to ensure they are culturally appropriate. At the local level, the Centre for Newfoundland Studies worked with Catharyn Andersen to develop culturally appropriate terminology for the Newfoundland Periodical Bibliography. The library is active in several projects that address the recommendations of the CFLA-FCAB Truth and Reconciliation Committee, in particular, recommendation 5 "Decolonize Access and Classification by addressing the structural biases in existing schemes of knowledge organization and information retrieval arising from colonialism by committing to integrating Indigenous epistemologies into cataloguing praxis and knowledge management." Moving forward, the Libraries will continue to change outdated subject headings to more culturally appropriate terms and change outdated or incongruous subject headings in our catalogue to more culturally appropriate terms (e.g., changing "Micmac" to "Mi'kmaq").

Indigenous Voices Project – The Centre for Newfoundland Studies is in the very early stages of a project entitled "Newfoundland Indigenous Voices." This project will identify, collect, and make Indigenous first-person accounts such as memoirs, biographies, reports, and studies available to users.

Embracing Indigeneity – The Libraries have engaged in activities to further the university's Indigenous mandate. To further our work in this with area, the University Library is undertaking a strategic project to better understand our Indigenous users and to further decolonize our collections, spaces, and services. One of the first activities connected to this strategic project will be connecting staff and librarians at Memorial with an Indigenous academic librarian in Canada to gain a better understanding and how to move forward with the initiative.






Reconciliation Initiatives from Prince Edward Island Library Services




News from Library Staff and Technicians Interest Group






Planning is underway for SRC 2022. Next year's theme is Transportation and the slogan will be "All Aboard!"





The nominees for NL Reads 2022 include:


Some People's Children by Bridget Canning (Breakwater Books)

All I Ask by Eva Crocker (House of Anansi Press)


We, Jane by Aimee Wall (Book*hug Press)

Latvian Ambassador Presents Books to Newfoundland and Labrador Public Libraries


The Latvian Ambassador to Canada, **H.E. Karlis Eihenbaums**, visited the A.C. Hunter Library in August to make a presentation of books about Latvia and Latvian culture to the Newfoundland and Labrador Public Libraries.

The Republic of Latvia is a small country (slightly larger than Nova Scotia) of around two million people. It is situated on the eastern shore of the Baltic Sea, between its two Baltic neighbours Estonia and Lithuania, and borders Belarus and Russia to the east.


Celebrating 30 Years of the Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award


To celebrate the 30th anniversary of the Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award and recognize this significant contribution by the Raddall family — who over the past 30 years has increased the size of the award from \$5,000 to the \$25,000 prize it is today — we partnered with the Writers' Federation of Nova Scotia to present a special event on September 23.

Past award winners talked about the impact the award has had on their lives and their writing. Each author also read a passage from a favourite winning book. Host of the event **Alexander MacLeod** called it a "literary conga line." Starting things off was **Anne Simpson**, the 2021 winner, who read from 2008 winner *Ragged Islands* by **Don Hannah**; who in turn read from 1993 winner *The Afterlife of George Cartwright* by **John Steffler**; who in turn read from 2000 winner *No Great Mischief* by Alistair MacLeod. Alistair MacLeod's son Alexander, a distinguished writer himself, read from 2019 winner *Something for Everyone* by **Lisa Moore**; who in turn read from 2007 winner *Scotch River* by **Linda Little**; who in turn

read from 2020 winner *The Innocents* by **Michael Crummey**; who closed the circle by reading from Simpson's winning 2021 novel, *Speechless*.

The Dalhousie Libraries holds the copyright to Raddall's works and the Writers' Federation of Nova Scotia administers the Raddall award.







Two Awards for the Dalhousie Archives for Outstanding Archival Work

The Dalhousie Libraries is delighted to share wonderful news that the Archives was recently the recipient of two awards from the Council of Nova Scotia Archives. The Archives serves as Dalhousie's corporate memory by identifying, preserving, and making available institutional records of enduring value, including textural, photographic, audiovisual, and electronic materials. The Archives also acquires records of independent student, alumni and employee organizations, private papers from prominent faculty and alumni, and university publications. Together, these records document the work of the university, and tell the story of the Dalhousie community and its people over time.

Doug Kirby Award for Outstanding Achievement in Archival Preservation




The Dalhousie Archives won the Doug Kirby Award for their **Digital Preservation System Project**, which began in 2018. Led by Digital Archivist **Creighton Barrett**, the Archives' need for a robust digital preservation solution became increasingly apparent as the Libraries began digitizing historic university records to celebrate Dalhousie's 200th anniversary in 2018.

With support from the senior leadership team of the Dalhousie Libraries and colleagues in Procurement, Creighton outlined the functional requirements and wrote a request for proposals for a digital preservation system based on the Open Archival Information System (OAIS) and other international digital preservation standards.

After years of testing and development, the Archives created its first standards-compliant Archival Information Packages (AIPs) in April 2021. While this research and development was under way, the Dal Libraries took the initiative to support its emerging digital preservation program in the following ways:

- Established a new Preservation Committee with a mandate to carry out Preservation Planning functions described in the Open Archival Information System (OAIS)
- Implemented new user-friendly "Managed File Transfer" software that will support a new file transfer service to be launched later this year. See our YouTube tutorial here.





- Reconfigured the Storage Area Network (SAN) digital storage environment that houses approximately 120 TB of archival data waiting to be ingested into the digital preservation system.
- Developed documentation on Archivematica and the Managed File Transfer software.

The Dal Libraries continues to work with Artefactual Systems to configure and maintain the digital preservation system.

Dr. Phyllis R. Blakeley Award for Outstanding Accomplishment in Archival Work

The Dalhousie Archives won the Dr. Phyllis R. Blakeley Award for the Ronald St. John MacDonald fonds processing project. Paulo Matheus de Sousa Lima, Archives Assistant, was the primary staff person for this project, receiving support from the Digital Archivist, the University Records Manager, and staff Archives Assistants.




The project ran from September 2020–March 2021 and was funded through a grant from the Provincial Archival Development Program (PADP). This funding allowed the Dalhousie University Archives to hire Matheus to focus on the personal archives of Ronald St. John MacDonald, an international law professor and judge. The archival fonds includes 15.64 metres of textual records and other material.

Matheus conducted an archival appraisal and then created and carried out a detailed plan to arrange and describe the fonds. He also rehoused the material in archival quality file folders and boxes. In total, Matheus created 691 file-level descriptions, 25 sub-series level descriptions, four series-level descriptions, and one fonds-level description. He also drafted an archival authority record that describes the life and career of Ronald St. John MacDonald. The archival appraisal and processing project resulted in the deaccessioning of 1.5 metres of textual records.

Congratulations to the 2022 CAUL-CBUA Collaborative Research Grant Recipients

The Dal Libraries' own Learning & Instruction Librarian **Lindsay McNiff** along with her colleague **Nicole Carter**, the Reference & Research Librarian at Saint Mary's University, have been awarded \$1,000 to help support their project, *Investigating the experiences of academic librarians on temporary contracts in Canada before and during COVID-19*. Congratulations!

From CAUL/CBUA:

In their proposal, Lindsay and Nicole propose to investigate the demographics of those academic librarians engaged in precarious work in Canada (including age, gender, ethnicity, sexual orientation, years since graduation), in what postsecondary environments they have been employed precariously (college, university, size of institution), the

nature of these contracts (reason, duration), and some key questions about their experience in these positions, including those raised in prior literature around training, socialization, and supervision. This is the first Canada-wide survey to investigate these questions with a focus on academic librarians with temporary contracts. The study will also zero in on how COVID-19 has affected the working life of librarians holding temporary contracts in academic libraries.

The CAUL-CBUA Collaborative Research Grant is intended to encourage collaborative research by librarians and staff working in academic libraries in the region through projects which involve structured, evidence-based research. We are pleased to continue offering support to researchers in the region and look forward to the results of Lindsay and Nicole's study.




Nova Scotia LGBT Seniors Archive










Nouvelles des services en français du Service des bibliothèques de l'Île-du-Prince-Édouard



News from UPEI Robertson Library

We are awaiting Board approval for term Systems Librarian and Metadata Librarian hires.

We welcomed two new part-time public service staff, **Stacey Meenink** and **Thea Stewart**, to help support the Service Desk.

The Library hosted three Young Canada Works funded positions over the summer - Art Collections Assistant, Digitization Student Assistant, and OER Associate. We also hosted a Mathematical and Computer Sciences co-op student that participated in the work of migrating our current research data management platform to the latest version of Islandora.

We were able to add the Scopus database to our subscriptions.

Continuing to update our <u>Textbook Access Program</u> to reduce students' costs for required texts by highlighting books (print and electronic) that the Library has available that are required for specific courses. In parallel, our Open Education Resource platform now hosts 11 OERs.

Updated our internal room booking system - https://rooms.library.upei.ca - to the latest version of Drupal. We converted 4 research rooms into "online class participation" rooms to help support students on campus moving from in-person classes to online classes.

A number of faculty have utilized our Covidence pilot to author systematic or other types of reviews that have been published. Librarians created a <u>service model</u> to support this pilot.


In early October the Library was listed as a COVID public exposure site.

Our <u>PEI Community Reads</u> of *The Skin We're In: A Year of Black Resistance and Power* by Desmond Cole continue to run each month.

We collaborated with the Student Union to purchase some light therapy lamps for the campus community to loan last year. The program has been really successful and our <u>20 lamps</u> are usually signed out.

The Library continues to work on developing an exhibit, "History of Nursing Education", in the Health Sciences Building on campus.

We did a soft relaunch of <u>IslandArchives</u>, our portal for accessing and displaying content from many of our PEI related digital collections.





We applied to host a Research Data Centre as part of the <u>Canadian National Research Data Centre</u>
Network and we were successful. We are currently in the planning process.
