University News:


Dr. Stuart Carney was appointed Dean of Medicine. Dr. Carney will begin a five-year term effective Jan. 1, 2026. Read more.

Research:

The Libraries migrated its Research Repository to <u>Scholaris—a national shared repository</u>. This will increase the accessibility and discoverability of Memorial research. Scholaris is hosted by Scholars Portal and was developed by the Canadian Association of Research Libraries (CARL), the Ontario Council of University Libraries (OCUL), University of Toronto Libraries (UTL), regional consortia, expert working groups, and members of the Canadian institutional repository community.

In early July, music librarian **Becky Smith** attended the International Association of Music Libraries (IAML) Congress, which took place in Salzburg, Austria, the birthplace of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. Canada was well represented with at least 20 Canadians in attendance, many of whom also presented. 


Other Cool Stuff:



These glasses are then sent free of charge on various humanitarian missions with trained medical personnel to places around the world where the donations can be put to good use.

His directive was to sell the books not needed with proceeds going back to CNS for future purchases. In total they raised over \$22,000.

The Award celebrates outstanding achievements in global literature and was worth 154,000 Canadian dollars.
