Krystal Dionne is a Regional Librarian with the PEI Public Library Service. She recently agreed to do a Q&A session to discuss the Stack Attack Podcast. Described as a podcast on books, culture and everything related to the world of libraries, Krystal shared some information about the podcast and why it was started.

Question: What is the name of the podcast? Who chose the title?

The podcast is called Stack Attack. A few of us brainstormed the title and created the logo together when we were thinking about starting it up.

Question: When did it start and why was it started?

Our first episode, Thrilling Tales: Prince Edward Island Ghost Stories was released on October 27, 2020.

We are always looking for new ways to serve the public beyond our physical walls. Podcasts can provide a unique platform to discuss a broad range of topics and to promote library programs, resources, and services. They are also a fun and stimulating outlet to utilize staff talent and to build connections within our community.

Question: What kind of topics do you cover?


We have covered a wide variety of different topics and often use the podcast to highlight community collaborations and upcoming programs. We have also recorded episodes in recognition or celebration of special months or days, and we regularly highlight books and other items in our collection through staff and quest recommendations.

Question: What have been some of your favourite episodes/series?

I've enjoyed working on all of the episodes for different reasons, but a few conversations that jump to mind are the recent October episode with Liam Richardson, the new PEI Provincial Archivist and our Summer Literacy episode from back in May.

I have a lot of fun connecting with folks (you'll hear me laugh a LOT) and hearing them share things that they're passionate about. Also, having access to the professional podcast studio at the Charlottetown Library Learning Centre for the past couple of years has made it even more exciting.

Question: Who would you like to interview on PEI? OR Nationally?



The Conversation Circle

The Immigrant & Refugee Services Association PEI (IRSA) is a settlement agency that helps new immigrants as they settle in PEI. One of the programs they host is The Conversation Circle. Program coordinator, **Zaven Almajian**, shared that this program is held at both the Kensington Heritage Library and the Summerside Rotary Library and is done with the supportive partnership IRSA has with both libraries and <u>United for Literacy</u>, a national charitable literacy organization.

Zaven Almajian states that "language and communication skills improvement or verbal practice are vital steps for newcomers attempting to settle and integrate to their new community, as part of the settlement process. IRSA is striving to ensure all of their clients have access to this important support, by helping remove barriers to service access by bringing these casual conversation groups to more Island communities."

Hailey Lewis works at the Kensington Heritage Library and says that "Having these conversational circles in our library has been so important. Not only does it provide a safe, welcoming and inviting place for



newcomers/immigrants to practice their English in a group setting, but it's been an eye-opening and educational experience for staff to learn about different cultures and backgrounds."




The Conversation Circle at the Kensington Heritage Library, November 2025.

Public Lecture: The Other Island Diaspora: PEI Books Abroad

On Thursday November 6, Robertson Library hosted a public lecture by The Reverend Edward Rix. One of North America's leading collectors of Prince Edward Island-connected books and ephemera, Father Rix






shared stories from his decades-long pursuit of PEI literary treasures. A proud Islander, with deep family roots in West Prince, Father Rix studied at the University of King's College in Halifax, the University of Toronto's Wycliffe College, and Dalhousie University. It was during his university days that he began to turn his passion for books into a successful venture as an independent bookseller and collector, learning from some of Canada's leading rare and antiquarian book dealers. Since 2001, he has served as Priest in charge of the Parish of All Saints Episcopal Church in Wynnewood, a western suburb of Philadelphia, where he has continued to build a remarkable personal library, including some 2000 titles relating to Prince Edward Island, with exemplary collections of the works of **Basil King** and **Milton Acorn** as particular highlights.

Father Rix brought enough treasures from his holdings to fill four display cases at the event. At the conclusion of his talk, he announced that he plans to donate his collection to Robertson Library in the future, which consists of approximately 2,000 items (and counting). 














Librarians:
