

From the President's Desk






Call for Proposals



Rebecca Thomas is an award-winning poet, activist, and Mi'kmaw Cultural Educator. She was the Poet Laureate for Halifax 2016-2018. Her family has roots in Lenno Island First Nation. Rebecca is the child of a residential school survivor – inspiring *I'm Finding My Talk* and *Swift Fox All Along* (nominated for a Governor General's Literary Award), and the poetry collection, *I Place You Into the Fire* (CBC Books' Best Canadian Poetry Pick in 2020). Rebecca was selected as a 2021 Writers' Trust Rising Star by Sue Goyette.

Rebecca uses her voice as a poet to inform the world about such topics as poverty and racism.


Closing Keynote






Concept drawing of exterior of soon-to-be-renovated R.P. Bell Library Centre for Innovation & Learning

News & Events

Mount Allison has unveiled concept drawings for both the R.P. Bell Library renovation and the space that will serve as a temporary library while the major renovation is underway from 2027-2030. A project timeline and details of the design are available on the R.P. Bell Library: Centre for Innovation and Learning website. Construction of a temporary library space begins in Spring 2025. The temporary space will be located behind the university's Athletic Centre, and will serve as a multi-sport complex when the R.P. Bell Library renovation is complete. The temporary space will house the main print collection, with additional storage space for lesser-used items in another building on campus.

Anne LePage, Technical Services and Systems Librarian, just returned from a sabbatical during which she began a project on a comprehensive bibliography of all faculty publications at Mount Allison. The bibliography will enable the library to create a more complete and detailed repository of the university's institutional output throughout its history.





Dr. Stephen Geier (STEM Librarian) and **Elizabeth Stregger** (Data and Digital Services Librarian) received a \$33,000 CEWIL grant to work on improving discoverability and preservation of Open Access journals edited by Mount Allison University faculty and students. Students in CHEM/BIOC 3991 (Research and Communication) and DATA 3101 (Data Acquisition and Organization) are developing and comparing workflows for metadata transformation using three approaches: human metadata work, AI-assisted work, and webscraping. Students have learned about open science, persistent identifiers, and publishing workflows in a series of guest lectures. The workshops for each course are designed to be complementary, with the results of one class creating examples for the other. The questions, problems, and solutions developed in these courses will help the library launch Open Journal Systems as a new digital service that supports faculty and student publishing.


Dr. Rachel Rubin, Dean of Libraries and Archives, is serving as co-lead of the university's new Strategic Planning Facilitation Team. She joins Economics professor **Dr. Craig Brett** in leading this venture to engage the university community in strategically thinking about the choices, actions and priorities that will inform a new strategic plan. The Strategic Planning Process (SPP) was launched by Mount Allison's new president, **Dr. Ian Sutherland**. "The SPP will help define our future – who we want to be as Mount Allison University, how we mould a future of excellence rooted in our academic mission to advance knowledge of all forms, nurturing the human condition," said Dr. Sutherland.

Staffing:

Librarian **Mike Roy** joined Mount Allison in August on a two-year term as Humanities and Student Success Librarian. He holds an MLIS from Dalhousie University (2020) and is an alumnus of Mount Allison University with a BA in English Literature (2016). Mike worked four years at Calgary Public Library and two years at Saint Mary's University before joining Mount Allison. He is originally from Moncton, NB on the traditional territory of the Maliseet and Mi'kmaq, and his professional and research interests include digital equity, information literacy, information access, and teaching.


Janice Stockall accepted a position as Manager of Access Services in October after serving in an interim capacity in this position for two years. Janice has 25 years' experience in academic libraries, including roughly 10 years at Mount Allison followed by another nine years at University of New Brunswick libraries.

The library welcomed **Robin Lightfoot** into the role of Access Services Assistant in September. Robin recently completed the Library and Information Technician program at Mohawk College, working in the Mount Allison Library during her practicum in Winter 2024. After working for several years in Toronto, Robin is happy to begin a new career in libraries and return to the Maritimes.

News from Memorial University of Newfoundland and Labrador Libraries

University News:

The search committee for the role of dean of the Faculty of Engineering and Applied Science has completed its work and recommended **Dr. Octavia Dobre** for the position. Dr. Dobre, who has been Interim Dean of the Faculty of Engineering and Applied Science since May 2022, will begin a five-year term effective January 1, 2026, upon completion of a year of administrative leave during which she will be focused on her tier 1 Canada Research Chair program. **Read more.**

The search committee for the role of dean of the School of Music has completed its work and recommended **Dr. Karen Bulmer** for the position. Dr. Bulmer, who has acted as interim dean of the Faculty of Music since June 2021, begins a five-year term effective November 5, 2024. Read More.


Research/Teaching and Learning:

Archives and Special Collections' **Matthew Keels** and **David Mercer**, as well as Library IT staff member **Dennis Flynn**, participated in a podcast called *Our Unsung Heroes: World War One Stories from Newfoundland and Labrador*. Episode one called "Objects of Remembrance" features both David and Matthew. Dennis is listed as a story collector for the podcast. <u>Have a listen</u>.

The Libraries launched a new and enhanced LibChat service that can now accept texts, as well as messages.

The Education Library launched a new event series entitled "Tales to Teach, Tales to Reach." Students, staff and faculty will have an opportunity to engage with talented writers, illustrators, and storytellers in Newfoundland and Labrador. By partnering with a local teacher librarian, students, staff and faculty will learn valuable lessons about integrating books and presentation skills in the classrooms. This collaborative series will highlight the rich collection at the Education Library and promote the love of literacy and the art of reading and writing. The first event is set for November 19 with local historian and author **Dale Jarvis**.





The Commons in the QEII Library has created a unique way to de-stress for students before and during exam period. Students are able to book one-hour <u>virtual reality equipment</u> to use the technology and games specifically purchased for de-stressing to meditate, colour, or even go on a world adventure.

The Centre for Newfoundland Studies and the Archives and Special Collections were both presenters at another very successful Whale of a day, an event that happened on October 5th, and that showcases various of Memorial's departments and faculties and the impact they have in our communities.

The Grenfell Library participated in Academic Prep Week from August 26-30, welcoming first year students to the Grenfell Campus and orienting them to university life. Librarians **Chelsea Humphries** and **Crystal Rose** delivered 6 unique classes, teaching students skills ranging from how to search for library resources and access course readings, to working with academic integrity and understanding and evaluating generative AI tools.

On October 10th, for World Mental Health Day, the Grenfell Library partnered with Counselling and Psychological Services to host a movie screening of Inside Out 2 accompanied by a discussion about anxiety and mental health resources on campus, plus free popcorn and door prizes! There was also displayed resources from the wellness collection in the library and screened Inside Out (captions only) on loop in the library all day.




WritersNL and NLPL's Writers-in-Residence

This fall, NLPL partnered with WritersNL to host four local authors at our libraries as part of the Year of the Arts 2024 initiative in Newfoundland & Labrador. The four Writers-in-Residence were selected by WritersNL to serve as literary ambassadors for their communities through providing encouragement and advice to other local authors. They also selected two Writers-in-Schools, **Sheilah Roberts Lukins** and **Sabrina Pinksen**, to present literary activities to NL classes.



From October 7th to November 3rd, **Sara Tilley was the Writer-in-Residence for the Melville Public Library**. Sara is the author of two novels: *Skin Room* and the Winterset award-winning *DUKE*. She has also written various plays in her time. During her residency, Sara offered one-on-one writing consultations with local aspiring writers, led a co-writing group, as well as hosted a Hallowe'en Open





Mic. Through these consultations, many connections were formed and a positive impact made on the communities.

From October 10th to November 8th, **Trudy Morgan-Cole was the Writer-in-Residence for Conception Bay South Public Library.** Trudy is the author of over 20 books, with a particular focus on historical novels set in Newfoundland. During her residence, Trudy offered one-on-one consultations, a writing workshop, and a public reading from her recent book series, *The Cupids Trilogy*. She also provided a presentation on her experience with re-imagining the unwritten stories of Newfoundland women, and other writers can do this in their own writing.

From October 17th to November 21st, **Douglas Walbourne-Gough was the Writer-in-Residence for Corner Brook Public Library.** Douglas has published two collections of poetry: *Crow Gulch* and *Island*. His work gives a raw insight around the Newfoundland Mi'kmaq experience. He has also published a chapbook of poetry titled *Colour Work* with Ansruther Press in January 2024. During his residency, Douglas offered one-on-one writing consultations as well as poetry writing workshops.

From October 22nd to November 20th, **Sharon Bala was the Writer-in-Residence for the A.C. Hunter Public Library**. Her debut novel, *The Boat People*, won various awards including the 2020 Newfoundland & Labrador Book Award and the 2019 Harper Lee Prize for Legal Fiction. Her short stories have been published in a variety of literary magazines. During her residence, Sharon offered one-on-one writing consultations and drop-in writing sessions. She also offered four workshops on a variety of writing skills.

Music in the Library! Bilingual Books & Music at the Corner Brook Public Library



The Acadia Archives recently debuted a new and improved website.


The library website now has a <u>new section</u> dedicated to accessibility information about the library and archives.

Funding for this initiative is part of the Government of Nova Scotia's cost of living support to increase access to menstrual supplies for all Nova Scotians.


Seniors' Day for Climate Change



News from Pictou-Antigonish Regional Library

It's official, we're now open! The Murray Family Public Library in the deCoste Culture Hub!


November 1, 2024 marked another auspicious milestone for the Pictou-Antigonish Regional Library. The Regional Library officially opened the new **Murray Family Public Library** at the deCoste Culture Hub, on the waterfront in downtown Pictou. It was a grand day, celebrated with many well wishes and great friends who dropped by to share their time with us — on our special day!

The Pictou Public Library has been renamed the Murray Family Public Library, in recognition of the Murray Family Foundation, who graciously supported the Culture Hub project and the construction of the new library within the deCoste Culture Hub. The deCoste Culture Hub brings together the deCoste Performing Arts Theatre, the Pictou-Antigonish Regional Library and Creative Pictou County! Since the deCoste Culture Hub opened its doors on 16 September, and until the November 1st Grand Opening, we've welcomed over 10,000 visitors in just 7 weeks.

The new space offers a refurbished theatre, with new seating, and expanded backstage area for storage – and enhanced accessibility, as well as a fully equipped catering kitchen, designed by The Kilted Chef and crew. In addition, a Community Art Studio space was created, to professional artist specifications that is a shared space managed by Creative Pictou County, a local arts society. The library has a Children's Rainbow Room, a MakerSpace and Technology area, and several small community meeting rooms, and a larger Community Room with a kitchen area. The shared spaces within the building include an Art Gallery, along the hallway between the library and theatre.

In addition, over a dozen commissioned pieces of public art were created for the deCoste Culture Hub, from a sculpture by **Dawn McNutt**, "The Muse" found on our front entrance at 99 Water Street, to a Celtic-inspired ceramic fireplace (with a mantel piece of wood from the Ship Hector) by **Denise Martin Lynch** and **Fenn Martin**, to a Literary Pollinator Garden by **Kiva-Marie Belt** (Seafoam Lavender) and **Johanna Skibsrud** (Scotiabank Giller Prize winner), and a stunning sculpture, "Wolverine and Little Thunder, Eel Fishing" by Mi'kmaw artist, **Alan Syliboy** and metal sculpturer, **Darren Martin** – on the new harbor front boardwalk with a set of sea stairs, that connects to the TransCanada Trail Head and the Jitney Trail. In the children's area we have an inspiring whimsical painted mural by children's illustrative artist, **Doretta Groendyck**, of children soaring over the harbor on the backs of large birds, as they prepare to go to bed with sleepy time stories. The front desk area is a shared space with the library circulation on the left, and the theatre's Box Office on the right, and over the desk is a 60-foot illuminated silk painted banner by **Holly Carr**, featuring the worlds of wildlife from the sea to the forest. In the Adult Fiction stacks, there are 3 end panels of woven tapestries in the Primary Colors by fibre artist, **Karen LeBlanc**.

In the Technology area, you will see a very large touch screen monitor on the wall, displaying a 3D rendering of a Merigomish Goose Boat (that can also be 3Dprinted), with a QR code that leads to a website of historical resources about the Goose Boat (or Sneak Boat). Next to the public computers is





the cozy fireplace, with our cultural and historical collections, featuring the stories by and about the local First Nations and Settler communities (Gaelic, French, and African Nova Scotians), and local historical reference documents.


Stepping into the Sunrise Reading Atrium, looking skyward, and dangling from the rafters are a series of Art Deco banners from painting of several iconic locations from around Pictou County, by painter **Benoit Paradis** from the Caribou Lighthouse, Green Hill Look off to the Pictou Causeway. Looking towards the wall above the entrances to the two Community Meeting Rooms/Offices is an 8-foot mural of the buildings of Water Street and Front Street in downtown Pictou – through time (seamlessly blending the old and new!), by historical illustrator **Theresa MacKenzie**. Peeking into the larger Community Meeting Room, there is an oil painting by artist, **Carolyn Bedford** of a writer seeking inspiration. Heading outside, at the harbor side entrance, and along the waterfront next to the sculpture, on the boardwalk is a poem about celebrating this special place, by writer **Thekla Altmann** (who also happens to be our Managing Branch Assistant at the Trenton Library). All of these inspiring pieces of public art were made possible through generous financial support from The Sobeys Foundation.

And the icing on the cake - the new library is now open Mondays through to Saturdays! All are welcome to drop on by, we'd love to meet you!







Pictou County Community Health Centre (PCCHC) Collaboration


On December 9th, the Pictou County Community Health Centre (PCCHC) will open its doors at 25B Front Street in downtown Pictou. Situated near the food bank and pharmacy in an accessible building, the Centre reflects what can be achieved when a community comes together with a shared vision for better health.

The CHC will be open to the public three days a week, including evening hours, with a full-time community health worker and a program developer on staff, as well as support from the Pictou-Antigonish Regional Library's (PARL) virtual care technician one day a week, ensuring flexible and accessible services.

Supported by the Aberdeen Health Foundation and the Department of Health and Wellness, this initiative is the result of years of collaboration, research, and a commitment to addressing gaps in local health care.

At the Prince of Wales Campus (PWC) Library


