News from Memorial University of Newfoundland and Labrador Libraries

University News:

Dr. Neil Bose has advised of his plan to retire on April 5, 2025, at the end of his current term as president and vice-chancellor *pro tempore*. <u>Read more</u>.

The search committee for the role of dean of the Faculty of Science has completed its work and recommended **Dr. James Gauld** for the position. Dr. Gauld will begin a five-year term effective April 1, 2025. <u>Read more</u>.

Dr. Jennifer Lokash has been appointed provost and vice-president (academic) of Memorial University. The appointment was approved on January 16 by the Board of Regents, following the unanimous decision of the search committee. <u>Read more.</u>

On Friday, January 31, Grenfell public services Librarian **Chelsea Humphries** presented at the OLA Super Conference in Toronto, facilitating a conversation about burnout in academic librarianship.

Cool Stuff:

The Grenfell Library partnered with the Corner Brook Public Library to run a Public Library Card Drive on October 22. There was a table in the library space where Corner Brook Public Library staff member **Brittany Noseworthy**, a Master's student in our MALA program, registered students on the spot for their public library cards and shared information about NLPL's digital resources. A total of 14 students registered!

Library team members **Crystal Rose** and **Krista Howell** travelled to the Bonne Bay Marine Station in Norris Point December 1-3 to assist the Director with his plans to update and renovate the "library." They identified 6 boxes of unique/rare materials that are now at Grenfell and will be catalogued and added to the Grenfell collection, completed the first ever weeding of the collection, and reorganized the remaining collection.

The Grenfell Library hosted the launch of the undergraduate journal, Bookish, on November 1st. Congratulations to staff member, **Kit Stone**, on her publication!

This winter the **Education Library** team got creative with community engagement with their faculty and staff. They introduced a soup club aimed at bring folks together, providing some nourishment to sustain them through the long, dark winter months.

The QEII Library hosted another successful scavenger hunt at the start of Winter Semester 2025 with Memorial's first-year biology students. The students made their way through various divisions and spaces throughout the QEII – in an effort to learn a little about biology and the amazing services and spaces of the library.

Late fall, 25 students from the College of the North Atlantic's Records Management and Archives program visited **Archives and Special Collections** in the QEII Library, and 50 from Holy Spirit High in Conception Bay South also got a tour of both the CNS and the Archives and Special Collections Division.

The **Labrador Campus Library** had an Emotional Chicken Ornament Making party before students went into finals. The Emotional Support Chicken in our library (not barcoded, or it would boost our library circulation statistics into the stratosphere) is the accidental Campus mascot. Public Services Librarian **Sarah Papple** knew the students would be heading home to families around Labrador with stories of the chicken, and thought a show-and-tell would be a better way to explain the concept! They enjoyed taking

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their minds off STEM with a little STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, ART, and Math). A little play goes a long way for concepts to solidify in the brain. It seems the Emotional Chicken Ornaments travelled far and wide.

This January, the community was invited to the **Labrador Campus Library** to watch the film *Kiss the Ground*. This viewing underscored the message of access and highlighted the digital streaming collections, and connected the growing group of growers seen at the Library Farm Friday program, (which is action research -- growing food in the North and sharing experiences over coffee and snacks in the library).

The **Labrador Campus Library** hosted the "Bad Portrait" program that encouraged participants to connect and be vulnerable in a collective afternoon of staring at each other and creating portraits with no artistic parameters. Although the campus celebrates the ways of learning though doing and being together, there are still the same stresses of "getting it right." A program that celebrates getting it wrong was a great way to build a growth mindset in the campus community.

Outreach

A two-day **Thesis Writing Retreat** was offered by the Library in January. Quiet study space, snacks, hot beverages, and information about getting research help was provided. This event was open to Honours and Graduate students.

In collaboration with the **Black Student Association** at Acadia, the Library recently hosted a free **Games Night** in our Quiet Reading Room.

The Library offered **library orientation sessions** to new incoming students at the start of Winter term. These sessions were designed to introduce new students to library resources, services, and spaces and concluded with a trip to the Archives.

In December, the Library will hosted a variety of **de-stress programming** during the exam period, including animal therapy (dogs and snakes), yoga, scrapbooking, on-site counselling, and study snacks.
