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## From the President's Desk



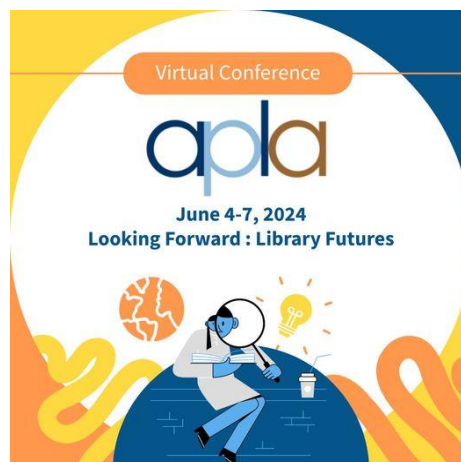

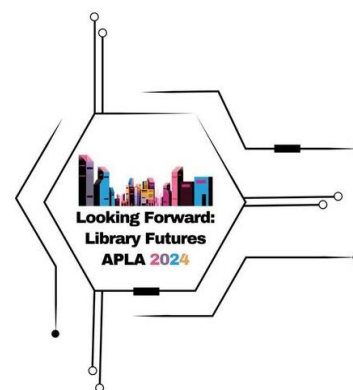

### News from Mount Allison Libraries & Archives

#### **News & Events:**

Mount Allison released a [concept design](#) in January for the soon-to-be-renovated R.P. Bell Library. The design includes a universal design for learning classroom, flexible collaboration spaces, and quiet study spaces with an overall focus on accessibility, intuitive layout, and natural light. The University plans to build an interim library to house library services and the general collection while the renovation takes place. A portion of the collection will also be housed on campus in the basement of Convocation Hall. The interim library building will become a multipurpose athletics complex when the R.P. Bell Library renovation is complete. Construction of the interim library should begin in 2024. The Library plans to relocate to the temporary space in Spring 2026. Construction begins on the R.P. Bell Library in Summer 2026, with a planned re-opening in Summer 2029. The project will cost an estimated \$85 million. See the [University's library renovation web pages](#) for details.

**Alexandra Tome** attended the Ontario Library Association Super Conference in January to present "Turning Green Dilemmas into Community Building and Outreach: The Plant Summer Camp Story." Alexandra is Assistant Head of Access Services in the R.P. Bell Library. She explained how she and colleagues volunteered to care for out-of-town students' and staff's plants for the summer in 2023, which provided a needed service but also an opportunity for creative—and at times hilarious—outreach on social media. #### **Staffing:**

Longtime Public Services Librarian **Jeff Lilburn** retired in September 2023. Jeff joined the Library in 2000 after completing a Master of Arts in English Literature (Western) and an MLIS (McGill). He primarily served as subject librarian for Drama, English & French literatures, and Sociology. Over his 20+ year career at Mount Allison, Jeff played key roles on many committees, including serving as president of the faculty union for two years, and serving twice on the collective bargaining and arbitration teams. He also served terms as a director on the boards of CAPAL and FNBFA, and spent two year on the CAUT Librarians' and Archivists' Committee. His publications and presentations over the years brought a critical, scholarly eye to issues of privacy, privatization, and corporate influences within academia.

**Alexandra Tome** accepted a position as Assistant Head of Access Services in September 2023. Alexandra began her library career in 2017 after graduating from Seneca College's Library and Information Technician program. Alex worked as the E-Learning Library Technician at Humber College before moving to New Brunswick and accepting a position in the Mount Allison Libraries' Technical Services



Department in 2021. Her work with marketing and outreach helped facilitate her move to Access Services, where she led initiatives such as the summer plant camp (see events, above). Alexandra is the convener for the Library Staff and Technician's Interest Group for APLA.

**Elle Archibald** joined Mount Allison in November 2023 as the Student Engagement Librarian, with subject responsibilities in Drama, English Literature, Modern Languages & Literatures, Philosophy, and Religious Studies. She previously worked at Capilano University and is the former Chief Librarian of Sechelt Public Library in British Columbia. She holds an MA from Wilfrid Laurier University and an MI from University of Toronto.

**Ramina Mukundan** joined Mount Allison in January 2024 as Technical Services Assistant, Collection Maintenance. She holds an undergraduate degree in Zoology, a post-graduate diploma in library automation and networking, and an MLIS from India. In 2023, she received her MI from Dalhousie University. ### News from Memorial University of Newfoundland Libraries

#### University News

Memorial University's Grenfell Campus experienced a cybersecurity incident on December 29, 2023. Security protocols were put in place to isolate the impacted systems, and an investigation is ongoing. IT staff worked night and day to reach operational functionality at Grenfell Campus: Wi-Fi in residence, printing and copying services, access to mun.ca emails and various solutions to help the winter semester get underway. In addition, almost all computer labs are now up and running for students and instructors. This took a tremendous amount of effort and co-ordination by our staff and faculty.

**Dr. Anne-Marie Sullivan** is the new Dean of the School of Human Kinetics and Recreation (HKR). Dr. Sullivan, who was in the role on an interim basis since summer 2021, began a five-year term effective December 8, 2023.

**Dr. Amy Warren** is the new Associate Vice-President (academic (AVPA) and Dean of the School of Graduate Studies (SGS). Dr. Warren, who was in the role on an interim basis since fall 2021, began a five-year term effective December 8, 2023.

#### Research

This March, the Centre for Newfoundland Studies is planning its second annual event that recognizes recent book publications or other creative works (not including journal articles) by the Memorial community. The event is tentatively scheduled for March 20, 2024.

As part of Love Data Week 2024, ACENET, the Office of the Chief Information Officer (CIO), and the Centre for Analytics, Informatics and Research (CAIR), are presenting on active data storage options available to MUN researchers. The event is scheduled for Feb. 13 and Health Sciences Library Head of Public Services, **Alison Farrell**, will be presenting.

The 2023 Memorial Libraries Research Fair was held on December 8th. This year's agenda was eclectic. It covered aspects of professional practice, such as **Janet Goosney's** - "We learned as we went like everyone else:" Experiences of librarians teaching information literacy at Canadian universities during the Covid-19 pandemic," or **Kristen Romme's** Lightning Round - "What Can Scopus Tell Us About Our Collections?" The presentations also delved into areas where personal interest and professional research mix in unique and creative ways. For example, **Lindsay Alcock's** Bricolage or **David Mercer's** "Data visualization: Numbers? Pictures?."

Public Services Librarian **Chelsea Humphries** ran an Introduction to Zotero workshop this fall. The presentation was recorded and is [available on the Library's YouTube channel](#). She also ran a portion of the hybrid workshop titled "Introduction to Archival and Primary Source Research for Graduate

Students: Thinking Inside and Outside the Box”, with Archives and Special Collections about Zotero and archival research.

As part of his cross-appointment with the Department of Sociology, Scholarly Communications Librarian **Dr. Patrick Gamsby** is teaching the Sociology of Time course for the Sociology department this term.

Associate Dean of Libraries, Grenfell Library, **Crystal Rose** presented on Open Access and the Research Repository as a part of Research Week at the Grenfell Campus on November 21.
